Step-by-Step Guide: How to Make a Classic Diwali Paper Lantern

Using your scissors, carefully cut along each vertical line, starting from the folded edge and stopping precisely at the border line. Do not cut through the border. If you are using a craft knife, place a cutting mat underneath and cut with a steady hand.

Step 4: Unfold and Shape

Gently unfold the paper. You will now have a large sheet with a series of slits in the center. Turn the paper so that the uncut border is at the top. Bring the two short ends of the paper together to form a cylinder. Overlap the edges slightly and secure them with glue or double-sided tape.

Step 5: Create the Bottom

To give your lantern a more finished look, you can add a base. Cut a small strip of paper about 1 inch wide and long enough to fit inside the bottom of the cylinder. Glue it in place. Alternatively, you can simply pinch the bottom strips together and glue them to a small circular piece of cardstock.

Step 6: Add the Handle and Light

Use your hole punch to create two small holes on opposite sides of the top border of the lantern. Thread a piece of ribbon or twine through the holes and tie a knot to create a hanging loop. Finally, place a battery-operated LED tea light inside. The light will shine through the slits, creating the beautiful, radiating glow that makes this Diwali paper lantern craft so magical.
