Mortality and the Fragility of

Life

From the very beginning, Doodle's survival is uncertain. He is not expected to live past infancy. The scarlet ibis, which dies after being blown off course by a storm, mirrors Doodle's own fragility. The Narrator (Brother)

respect. She says that Doodle might live because he is "a caul child," meaning he was born with a piece of the amniotic sac still covering his head, which folklore says grants special protection. She also remarks that the dead ibis is "a bird of a different color," hinting at its symbolic meaning. Your answers about her role should point out that she represents compassion and intuition, qualities the narrator lacks.

The Scarlet Ibis Itself

The ibis is the most important symbol in the story. It is a tropical bird, far from home, just as Doodle is a child whose body is not suited for the harsh world he inhabits. The Storm
