Determining Your Protein Needs

Your protein target depends on your weight, activity level, and goal. A general recommendation for someone on a whey protein shake diet plan is:

- Sedentary: 1.2–1.6 g/kg body weight
- Moderately active: 1.6–2.0 g/kg
- Athletes or those in a calorie deficit: 2.0–2.4 g/kg

Sample 7-Day Whey Protein Shake Diet Plan

Breakfast Shake Ideas

- Lean beef stir-fry with bell peppers, onions, and brown rice.
- Turkey lettuce wraps with avocado and tomato.

Snack Shakes

Use one shake mid-afternoon or post-workout, depending on your schedule.

- 1 scoop whey isolate + water or unsweetened coconut milk.
- Add 5g of fiber powder for extra satiety.

Day 1: Breakfast green berry shake. Lunch: grilled chicken quinoa bowl. Snack: chocolate shake. Dinner: turkey lettuce wraps.

Day 2: Breakfast oatmeal shake. Lunch: salmon and sweet potato. Snack: vanilla shake. Dinner: beef stir-fry.

Day 3: Breakfast peanut butter chocolate shake. Lunch: turkey wraps. Snack: berry shake. Dinner: chicken and broccoli.

Day 4: Breakfast green berry shake. Lunch: beef stir-fry. Snack: chocolate shake. Dinner: salmon asparagus.

Day 5: Breakfast oatmeal shake. Lunch: chicken quinoa. Snack: vanilla shake. Dinner: turkey wraps.

Day 6: Breakfast peanut butter chocolate. Lunch: salmon sweet potato. Snack: berry shake. Dinner: beef stir-fry.

Day 7: Flexible — you can repeat a favorite combination or have a small treat meal if it fits your calories.
