Strong English Bad Words and Their Telugu Equivalents

These are the most taboo words in the English language. Using them in public, at work, or around family is considered highly offensive and can lead to serious social consequences.

- **Fuck** – This is the most famous and versatile English curse word. It can be used as a verb, noun, exclamation, and intensifier. It expresses

anger, frustration, surprise, or emphasis. "Fuck you!" "This is fucking great." "I don't give a fuck."

more religious circles.
