Weight and Capacity

Depending on the material generation, a Guide 147 weighs approximately 65 to 75 pounds. This is a manageable weight for two people to lift onto a car roof or carry a short distance to the water. The canoe has a generous maximum capacity, typically rated for around 600 to 700 pounds. 4. **Seats and Yokes:** The cane or webbed seats may eventually sag. They are easily replaceable with aftermarket kits if needed.
5. **Repairs:** For polyethylene canoes, deep gouges can be filled with a plastic welder or epoxy designed for polyethylene. For minor scratches, a heat gun can sometimes be used to smooth the surface (use extreme care). Royalex can be more complex to repair but is also exceptionally impact-resistant.
