Without proper lighting, even the best lenses are useless. The illumination system ensures the specimen is brightly and evenly lit.

- **Condenser:**

Located beneath the stage, the condenser focuses light from the illuminator onto the specimen. A common worksheet question asks students to explain why the condenser is essential for high-magnification work, as it concentrates the light beam for

- **Iris Diaphragm:**

Mechanical System: The Framework and Controls

- **Arm:** The curved or angled part connecting the

How to Effectively Complete a Parts of a Compound Microscope

Functions to Master: Matching Parts to Their Roles
