You can also write versions for the other sides. Use the Law of Cosines when you know:

- Two sides and the included angle (SAS)
- All three sides (SSS)

Problem 2 (Law of Cosines - SAS)

In triangle PQR, side p = 10, side q = 14, and included angle R = 30° . Find side r.

Solution: Use Law of Cosines: $r^2 = p^2 + q^2 - 2pq \cos(R) = 100 + 196 - 280 \cos 30^\circ = 296 - 242.49 = 53.51$, so $r \approx 7.32$.

Problem 3 (Ambiguous Case - SSA)

In triangle XYZ, side x = 7, side y = 9, and angle X = 35° . How many triangles? Solve if possible.

Solution: Use Law of Sines: $\sin Y / 9 = \sin 35^\circ / 7 \rightarrow \sin Y = (9 \sin 35^\circ) / 7 \approx 0.738$. $Y \approx 47.6^\circ$ or 132.4° . Both are valid (since $47.6 + 35 < 180$ and $132.4 + 35 < 180$). So two triangles. Solve each.

A good worksheet would then ask you to find all missing sides and angles for both triangles.
