“Napoleon is always right.”

On **page 105**, during the trials where the confessing animals are executed, Squealer uses this line to justify the purges. It is a masterclass in doublespeak. The pigs claim to believe in equality even as they orchestrate the murder of their fellow animals. This quote is vital for essays on propaganda and hypocrisy.
