Sign: FOR (a simple pointer sign or index finger out) / BIBLE / TELL / ME / SO (or TRUE).

Line: Little ones to Him belong;

Sign: LITTLE / ONES (plural of person) / TO / HIM (point to the side) / BELONG (as if belonging to, or MINE).

Line: They are weak, but He is strong.

Sign: THEY / ARE / WEAK (arms drooping, showing fragility) / BUT / HE (point to the side) / IS / STRONG (flex muscles).

Signing the Chorus

Line: Yes, Jesus loves me!

Sign: YES (a nodding fist) / JESUS / LOVE / ME!

Line: Yes, Jesus loves me!

Sign: YES / JESUS / LOVE / ME!

Line: Yes, Jesus loves me!

Sign: YES / JESUS / LOVE / ME!

Line: The Bible tells me so.

Sign: BIBLE / TELL / ME / SO (or TRUE).

Signing the Second Verse

Line: Jesus loves me! He who died

Sign: JESUS / LOVE / ME / HE / WHO (a question marker) / DIE.

Line: Heaven’s gate to open wide;

Sign: HEAVEN (point up, away from you) / GATE (shape an arch with your hands) / OPEN (push hands apart) / WIDE (emphasize the open space).

Line: He will wash away my sin,

Sign: HE / WILL / WASH (scrub your hands) / AWAY (push hand to the side) / MY / SIN (make two fists and cross your wrists, pulling them apart).

Line: Let His little child come in.

Sign: LET / HIS / LITTLE / CHILD (pat an imaginary child’s head) / COME / IN (beckon and motion in).
