Getting Started with Qlik Sense

Logging In and Understanding the Hub

When you first visit your organization’s Qlik Sense portal, you will be prompted to enter your credentials. After a successful login, the Hub displays all the apps and streams available to you. Think of streams as folders that group related apps by department, project, or topic. Each app contains sheets, which are like pages where visualizations live. To open an app, simply click its tile. The Hub also provides a search bar if you want to find a specific app quickly. Take a moment to browse the available streams and familiarize yourself with the layout.

Navigating Apps and Streams

Once inside an app, you will see a navigation pane on the left side. This pane lists all the sheets within that app. Click any sheet name to jump directly to it. At the top of the screen, you will find a toolbar with options to edit the sheet (if you have permission), create bookmarks, or export data. The main area of the screen displays the visualizations—charts, tables, maps, and more. You can scroll through the sheet or use the sheet overview to see a thumbnail of each sheet. Understanding this navigation is the first step to becoming proficient with the Qlik Sense end user experience.

Key Concepts for End Users

To make the most of Qlik Sense, you need to grasp two fundamental ideas: associations and selections. These concepts are at the heart of how Qlik Sense processes data and enables dynamic exploration.

Associations and Selections

Unlike traditional query-based tools, Qlik Sense uses an associative data model. This means every piece of data in your app is linked to every other piece. When you click on a value in one chart, all other visualizations instantly update to show only the data related to that selection. For example, if you are viewing sales data and click on a specific product category, all charts will adjust to show only that category’s performance. This associative engine allows you to explore relationships organically, without writing filters or queries. **Selections** are the actions you take to focus the data—by clicking, lassoing, or using the selection tool. You can also see which values are associated (green), excluded (white or gray), or not applicable.

Dimensions and Measures

When building or customizing visualizations, you will hear about dimensions and measures. A **dimension** is a field that contains categorical data, such as product name, region, or month. A **measure** is a numeric field that you want to aggregate, like sales amount or count of orders. In Qlik Sense, you can drag and drop these fields into chart properties to create visualizations. Understanding the difference helps you interpret charts correctly and even modify them if you have editing rights.

Building Your First Visualization

One of the most satisfying skills for any end user is creating a simple chart. While many apps are pre-built, you may want to add a personal sheet or adjust an existing one. Here is a step-by-step approach using the Qlik Sense end user interface.

Creating a Sheet

To create a new sheet, open an app and click the **New Sheet** button (usually a plus icon). Give your sheet a meaningful name and optionally a description. Then click **Edit** to start adding visualizations. The edit mode opens a blank canvas with a left panel containing fields from the data model. These fields can be dimensions or measures. You can also use the **Chart** button to add a visualization object.

Adding Charts and Tables

Drag a field from the left panel onto the canvas. Qlik Sense will automatically suggest a visualization type based on the data. For example, dragging a dimension like “Region” and a measure like “Sales” might create a bar chart. You can change the chart type using the properties panel on the right. Common charts for end users include bar charts, line charts, pie charts, and pivot tables. Once you are satisfied, click **Done** to save your sheet. Remember to check that your selections and filters work as expected.

Interacting with Data: Selections and Filters

Qlik Sense is designed for exploratory analysis. Interacting with data is intuitive and immediate. Here are the main ways you can drill into your data.

Making Selections

Simply click on any element in a visualization—a bar, a slice, a table cell—to select it. The selection is highlighted in green. All other visualizations on the sheet update to reflect only the data associated with that selection. You can make multiple selections by holding down the Ctrl key (or Command on Mac) while clicking. To clear a selection, click the selected item again or use the **Clear All Selections** button in the toolbar. This interactive capability is one of the most powerful features for any end user of Qlik Sense.

Using Lasso and Range Selections

Some visualizations support advanced selection methods. For scatter plots, line charts, or maps, you can use the lasso tool to draw a freeform shape around multiple data points. This selects all points within the lasso. Range selections are useful for date or numeric axes: click and drag along the axis to select a range of values. These techniques allow you to define complex filters without typing any criteria. Practice using them on a sample sheet to become comfortable.

Advanced Features for Power Users

Once you feel confident with basic interactions, you can explore additional features that enhance your productivity and communication of insights.

Bookmarks and Storytelling

A **bookmark** captures the current state of selections so you can return to it later. To create a bookmark, click the bookmark icon in the toolbar, give it a name, and save. You can then load that bookmark whenever you want to revisit a specific analysis. **Storytelling** is a more advanced feature that lets you create a narrative presentation using snapshots of your sheets. You can add text, images, and annotations to tell a data story. This is ideal for sharing findings with colleagues who may not use Qlik Sense daily.

Exporting and Sharing Insights

If you need to share data outside the platform, Qlik Sense provides several export options. You can export data from a chart or table as an Excel file, PDF, or image. Click the three-dot menu on any visualization and choose **Export**. Additionally, you can share a link to a specific sheet or bookmark via email. Some organizations also allow end users to create **alerts** that trigger when data meets certain conditions. Check with your administrator for sharing permissions.

Tips and Best Practices for Efficient Analysis

To become a truly effective end user, keep these tips in mind while using the Qlik Sense end user guide as your reference.

- **Start with pre-built apps:** Most organizations provide curated apps designed for common questions. Explore those first before creating your own sheets.
- **Use the search bar:** In the Hub, you can search for apps, sheets, or even values within data. This is a fast way to locate information.
- **Leverage tooltips:** Hover over any data point to see a tooltip with additional details. Many tooltips can be customized by the app developer.
- **Keep selections simple:** Too many selections can narrow the data too much. Use the selection counters to see how many records are selected.
- **Save your work:** When editing sheets, save frequently. Unsaved changes may be lost if the session times out.
- **Ask for help:** If a field or calculation seems unclear, reach out to the app owner or your analytics team. Understanding the data model improves your analysis.
