The One Ring

Forged by Sauron himself in the fires of Mount Doom, this is the master ring. It rules all the others and is the central object of the entire quest. Its only inscription reads the famous Black Speech: "One Ring to rule them all, One Ring to find them, One Ring to bring them all and in the darkness bind them."
