3. Problem-Solving and Critical Thinking

a medical student on a rural placement. The clinic runs out of flu vaccine, and only enough has arrived for 50 patients. Over 200 elderly patients are waiting. How do you decide who gets it?"

How to approach:

Acknowledge the scarcity and the ethical principle of justice. Propose a fair triage system: prioritize the most medically vulnerable (e.g., those with chronic heart/lung

disease).

Consider a lottery for other patients. Communicate transparently with the crowd.

- **Structure:** Identify the criteria (medical need, age, risk factors), explain the process, and consider the emotional impact of the decision.

Collaborative Task Stations

Sometimes you are paired with

another candidate (or an actor) to complete a simple task, like building a tower with blocks or discussing a controversial topic. The focus is on teamwork, not the output.

Example Task:

"You and your partner must decide on five essential items for a disaster relief kit. You have 8 minutes to agree on a list and explain your reasoning. The time starts now."

How to approach: Show leadership without being

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bossy. Actively invite your partner's opinions: "What do you think is most important?"

Acknowledge their ideas: "That's a good point." If you disagree, state your reasoning politely: "I see why that's useful, but I wonder if water filter might be more critical for survival?" The goal is to demonstrate collaboration, not dominance.

If the cost remains prohibitive, I would shift the focus to maximizing quality of life through palliative care, emphasizing that this is not giving up

redirecting care toward comfort and dignity.

Throughout, I would respect the patient's autonomy and avoid letting my own biases about cost-effectiveness influence my tone. Ultimately, the decision must be the patient's, but my role is to guide and support, not to abandon them in their frustration."
