Titchener believed that by breaking down mental experiences into their simplest components, such as sensations, feelings, and images, psychologists could understand the structure of the mind. Introspection involved trained participants describing their conscious experiences in response to stimuli. For example, a participant might describe the taste of an apple in terms of its sweetness, tartness, texture,

and temperature.

Criticisms and Legacy

Structuralism faced significant criticism for its reliance on introspection, which was subjective and difficult to verify. Different participants often reported different experiences, and the method could not easily study children, animals, or individuals with mental illness. Despite these limitations, structuralism established psychology as a laboratory science and emphasized the importance of systematic

Core Concepts of Psychoanalysis

Behaviorism emerged in the early 20th century as a reaction against the subjectivity of structuralism and psychoanalysis. Led by John B. Watson, B.F. Skinner, and Ivan Pavlov, behaviorism argued that psychology should focus exclusively on observable behavior, not ~~unobservable~~ mental states.

Watson famously claimed that he could take any healthy infant and train them to become any type of specialist, regardless of their talents or tendencies. This radical environmentalism emphasized the power of learning and conditioning. Pavlov's classical conditioning demonstrated how a neutral stimulus (a bell) could come to elicit a response (salivation) through association with an unconditioned stimulus (food). Skinner's operant

conditioning showed how behaviors are shaped by consequences such as reinforcement and punishment.

Contributions and Criticisms

Behaviorism brought rigor and objectivity to psychology, introducing experimental methods that are still used today. It led to effective behavioral therapies for phobias, addictions, and other disorders. However, critics argue that behaviorism ignores important
