- Have been living in Australia on a valid visa for the past four

years immediately before applying.

- Have held a permanent residency visa for at least 12 months at the time of application.
- Have been physically present in Australia for a total of at least 12 months out of the past four years, including at least 9 months in the last 12 months before applying.

Absences from Australia during this period are allowed but must be limited. The Department also considers the length and purpose of any travel to ensure you have a genuine connection to Australia.

Good Character Requirement

All applicants aged 18 years or over must be of good character. This means you must not have a substantial criminal record or any pending charges. The Department will assess your police clearance certificates, any court orders, and your history of compliance with Australian laws. If you have any criminal convictions, you may need to provide additional documentation or wait for a specified period before applying.

Basic Knowledge of English

You need to demonstrate a basic understanding of the English language. This is assessed through the citizenship test, which includes reading, writing, and listening components. Applicants aged 60 and over, or those with a permanent physical or mental impairment that prevents them from meeting the

language requirement, may be exempt.

Knowledge of Australia

Every applicant between 18 and 59 years of age must pass the Australian citizenship test. The test covers topics such as Australia's history, values, government system, and the rights and responsibilities of citizens. You can prepare using the official Australian citizenship test resource book *"Our Common Bond"*.

Intent to Reside or Maintain a Close Association

You must intend to live in Australia or maintain a close association with Australia after becoming a citizen. This does not mean you cannot travel overseas, but your core life and commitments should be in Australia.

Different Pathways to Australian Citizenship

There are several ways to become an Australian citizen, depending on your personal circumstances. Understanding which pathway applies to you is essential when learning **how to get Australian citizenship**.

Citizenship by Conferral

This is the most common pathway for permanent residents who have lived in Australia for a qualifying period. You apply to the Minister for

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Home Affairs, who then confers citizenship upon you. This is a formal decision that grants all the rights of a birth citizen (except for representation in Parliament – though that may also be possible after a period).

Citizenship by Descent

If you were born outside Australia but have a parent who is an Australian citizen, you may be eligible for citizenship by descent. This applies to children who are born overseas on or after 26 January 1949. You must provide evidence of your parent's citizenship and your own birth certificate. There is no residency requirement for this pathway.

Citizenship by Adoption

If you are a child adopted by an Australian citizen under a full adoption order that meets Australian standards, you may acquire citizenship automatically or upon application. This pathway is designed to protect the best interests of the child.

Citizenship by Birth

A person born in Australia on or after 20 August 1986 is automatically an Australian citizen if at least one parent was an Australian citizen or permanent resident at the time of birth. There are also provisions for children born in Australia who would otherwise be stateless.

Renunciation and

Resumption

If you once held Australian citizenship but renounced it, you may be able to resume it under certain conditions. This is a less common pathway and requires demonstrating a strong connection to Australia and a reason for wanting to reacquire citizenship.

Step-by-Step Application Process

Now that you understand the eligibility and pathways, let's look at the actual process of **how to get Australian citizenship** by conferral, which is the most frequently used route.

Step 1: Check Your Eligibility

Use the online eligibility tool on the Department of Home Affairs website. Ensure you meet the residency, character, and language criteria before proceeding.

Step 2: Gather Required Documents

You will need certified copies of:

- Passport (all pages) and travel documents
- Birth certificate
- Marriage or divorce certificates (if applicable)
- Police clearance certificates from Australia and any country where you lived for 12 months or more in the last 10 years
- Evidence of your permanent residency visa
- Any name change certificates

- Two passport-sized photographs

All documents not in English must be translated by a NAATI-accredited translator.

Step 3: Submit Your Application Online

Create an ImmiAccount on the Department's website and complete the online application form for Australian citizenship (Form 1300). You will need to pay the application fee, which is currently around AUD 490 (subject to change). After submission, you will receive an acknowledgement letter with a receipt number.

Step 4: Prepare for the Citizenship Test

If you are aged 18 to 59, you will be invited to sit the test. Study the *"Our Common Bond"* resource. The test consists of 20 multiple-choice questions (15 in the new version from late 2020) and you must score at least 75% to pass. You will also need to demonstrate English language proficiency through a reading, writing, and listening assessment that is part of the test.

Step 5: Attend the Interview and Test

You will be notified of an appointment at a Department office. Bring your original documents for verification. The interview typically covers your application details, and then you take the test on a computer.

Step 6: Wait for the Decision

Processing times vary but generally take from 6 to 12 months. You can check your application status through ImmiAccount. The Department may request additional information or documents during this period.

Step 7: Attend a Citizenship Ceremony

If your application is approved, you must make a pledge of commitment as an Australian citizen at an official ceremony. You will receive an invitation from your local council or the Department. Ceremonies are usually held within six months of approval. At the ceremony, you will receive your Australian citizenship certificate.

Tips for a Successful Application

- **Keep thorough records of your travel history:** The Department will check your movements in and out of Australia. Maintain a log of dates and reasons for travel.
