Tips for Direct Code Entry

- Make sure batteries are fresh and correctly inserted.
- Keep the remote within a few feet of the device during programming.
- Write down the successful code for future reference.
- If the red light does not turn off after entering the code, the code may be invalid or the remote may require a longer press. Try a different code.

Method 2: Auto Code Search (For When You Don’t Have the Code)

If you cannot find the correct code for your device, or if your device brand is not listed, the auto code search method is a powerful alternative. The remote will cycle through its entire built-in code library automatically. This process can take several minutes, but it is highly effective. Here is the complete procedure for **how to program a RCA universal remote using auto code search**:

- Turn on the device you want to control manually.
- Press and hold the **SETUP** button until the red indicator light turns on, then release.

- Once the device turns off, immediately press the **ENTER** or **STOP** button to save the code. The red light will turn off.
- Test the remote. If it controls volume, channels, and input, you’re done.

If you accidentally skip past the code that worked, you can reverse the search by pressing the **REW** (rewind) button instead of PLAY. Some newer RCA remotes allow you to use the **CH+** and **CH-** buttons to navigate the code library forward and backward. Consult your remote’s manual for specific key assignments.

Important Notes for Auto Code Search

- The auto search method works best when the device is already on, because it relies on the power-off response.
- Be patient: the process can take several minutes if you start from the beginning of the library.
- If the device never turns off, you may have pressed the wrong device key. Start over and double-check.

Method 3: Brand Code Search

Some RCA remotes offer a hybrid approach known as brand code search. Unlike the full auto search, this method limits the search to only the codes for a specific brand, which saves time. To use this method, you will need to know the brand of your device. Here’s how it works:

- Turn on the device manually.
- Press and hold **SETUP** until the red light turns on, then release.
- Press the device key (e.g., TV). The red light blinks and stays on.

Some Functions Work but Others Don’t

- Not all codes support every feature. You may need to try a different code for your brand that includes more functionality (e.g., volume, input selection).
- Some devices (like certain streaming sticks) may require a different device type setting. For example, program an Amazon Fire Stick under the DVD or AUX key.

Programming Additional Devices

Once you have successfully programmed one device, you can repeat the process for others using the same remote. RCA universal remotes typically support up to four devices. For instance, you can control your TV, cable box, DVD player, and soundbar all from one remote. Simply press the corresponding device key (e.g., TV, STB, DVD, AUX) before the device you want to control. The remote will automatically switch modes.

To program a second device, follow the same method (direct code or code search) but press the correct device key at the start. For example, to program your cable box, press the **STB** or **CABLE** key (if available) after entering setup mode.

Advanced Features and Volume Control

Many RCA remotes allow you to set volume and mute to control a specific device regardless of which device mode you are in. This is called **volume punch-through**. To enable it:

1. Press and hold **SETUP** for 3 seconds until the red light stays on.
2. Press the **VOL+** button once.
3. Press the device key you want the volume to control (e.g., TV).
4. The red light will blink and then turn off.

Now whenever you adjust volume, it will affect the designated device even if you are in DVD or STB mode. This feature is extremely convenient for simplifying your viewing experience.

When All Else Fails: Resetting Your RCA Remote
