- **Comparing fractions:** Using common denominators or benchmarks like $\frac{1}{2}$ to compare sizes.
- **Adding and subtracting fractions:** With like denominators, including mixed numbers.
- **Multiplying fractions by whole numbers:** $3 \times \frac{1}{4} = \frac{3}{4}$
- **Decimal notation for fractions:** Understanding that $0.5 = \frac{1}{2}$ and comparing decimals to the hundredths place.

Measurement and Data

- **Area and perimeter:** Calculating these for rectangles and solving problems involving missing side lengths.
- **Angle measurement:** Using a protractor and understanding types of angles (acute, obtuse, right).
- **Unit conversions:** Converting between units like hours to minutes, feet to inches, or liters to milliliters.
- **Data representation:** Reading and creating line plots, bar graphs, and pictographs.
- **Money and time problems:** Real-world scenarios involving calculations with dollars and cents or elapsed time.

Geometry

- **Lines and angles:** Identifying parallel, perpendicular, and intersecting lines.
- **Two-dimensional shapes:** Classifying triangles, quadrilaterals, and other polygons based on properties.
- **Symmetry:** Recognizing lines of symmetry in figures.
