First Class Passengers

The first class section of the Titanic's passenger list reads like a who's who of early 20th century high society. Among the most famous names on the list of people on the Titanic in first class were John Jacob Astor IV, one of the wealthiest men in the world at

the time; Benjamin Guggenheim, the mining magnate; and Isidor Straus, co-owner of Macy's department store, who famously refused a seat on a lifeboat to remain with his wife Ida. These individuals booked passage at prices ranging from £30 to £870 for the most luxurious suites, which would be tens of thousands of dollars in today's currency.

Other notable first class passengers included Margaret "Molly" Brown, who later became famous as the "Unsinkable Molly Brown" for her efforts to help other survivors while in Lifeboat No. 6; Sir Cosmo Duff Gordon and his wife Lucile, a prominent fashion designer; and Thomas Andrews, the ship's architect who was aboard to observe the maiden voyage. First class passengers represented about 325 individuals, and they enjoyed the most luxurious accommodations ever seen on a ship, including a gymnasium, squash court, Turkish bath, and multiple dining venues.

Second Class Passengers

The second class section of the list of people on the Titanic included approximately 285 passengers, many of whom were professionals, academics, and middle-class families. Notably, the second class manifest included a significant number of religious figures, including several ministers and missionaries

traveling to speak or serve in the United States. Among the most famous second class passengers was Lawrence Beesley, a science teacher who survived the sinking and later wrote one of the most detailed firsthand accounts of the disaster titled "The Loss of the SS Titanic."

Second class passengers paid between £12 and £13 for their tickets, which provided accommodations that were considered superior to first class on most other ships of the era. Their quarters included comfortable cabins, a library, a smoking room, and a dining saloon that rivaled the first class facilities on older liners. Many second class passengers were traveling for business, religious work, or to join family members already established in America.

Third Class Passengers

The largest group on the list of people on the Titanic was the third class passengers, also known as steerage. Approximately 710 individuals traveled in third class, representing a wide range of nationalities and ethnicities. These passengers were primarily emigrants from across Europe seeking better opportunities in the United States and Canada. The third class manifest included individuals from Ireland, Sweden, Finland, Russia, Italy, Greece, Syria, and many other countries.

Third class passengers paid between £3 and £8 for their tickets, which represented a significant investment for working-class families. Many were traveling with all their worldly possessions packed into trunks and baskets, dreaming of starting new lives. Tragically, the survival rate for third class passengers was dramatically lower than for those in first and second class. Of the third class passengers on the list of people on the Titanic, only about 25 percent survived, compared to roughly 60 percent of first class passengers. This disparity has been attributed to both the location of third class quarters deep in the ship and the difficulty of navigating the maze of corridors to reach the lifeboat deck.

The Crew of the Titanic

No list of people on the Titanic would be complete without including the crew, who numbered approximately 885 to 900 individuals. The crew members were divided into several departments, each with specific responsibilities for the operation of the ship. The deck department, headed by Captain Edward J. Smith, included officers, quartermasters, lookouts, and seamen. Captain Smith was a commodore of the White Star Line and had planned to retire after this voyage, making the tragedy all the more poignant.

The engine department was the largest single group

in the crew manifest, with approximately 325 engineers, firemen, coal trimmers, and greasers working in the bowels of the ship to keep the massive steam engines running. These men worked in harsh conditions, shoveling coal into furnaces in temperatures that often exceeded 100 degrees Fahrenheit. When the ship began to sink, many engineers remained at their posts, working to maintain power and pumps until the very end. Not a single engineer survived.

The victualing department included stewards, cooks, bakers, waiters, and other service staff who catered to the needs of passengers. This group also included the ship's band, led by Wallace Hartley, which famously continued playing as the ship sank to help maintain calm. All eight band members perished. The list of people on the Titanic also includes the ship's surgeon, Dr. William O'Loughlin, and pursers who handled administrative duties.

Notable Individuals and Their Stories

The passenger manifest of the Titanic contains countless personal stories that have captivated the world for over a century. Among the most compelling narratives on the list of people on the Titanic is that of the youngest passenger, Millvina

Dean, who was just two months old when she boarded with her parents. She lived until 2009, the last surviving passenger of the disaster. Her father was one of the many third class passengers who did not survive.

The most famous love story associated with the Titanic is that of Ida and Isidor Straus. Witnesses reported seeing the elderly couple on the deck, with Isidor refusing to board a lifeboat while younger women and children remained on the ship. Ida refused to leave her husband, reportedly saying, "Where you go, I go." They were last seen sitting together on a deck chair as water washed over the ship. Their enduring devotion became one of the most enduring symbols of the tragedy.

The list of people on the Titanic also includes less celebrated but equally remarkable individuals. Lookout Frederick Fleet, who spotted the iceberg and rang the warning bell, survived the disaster and later testified at the inquiries. Charles Lightoller, the second officer, was the most senior officer to survive and provided crucial testimony about the ship's final hours. He also commanded a small boat that rescued several people from the water after the sinking.

How the List Was Compiled and Survived

Some passengers booked tickets but failed to board at the last minute, while others were not officially registered. The crew manifest was similarly complicated, as some crew members were signed on just before departure, and records were not always centralized.

After the disaster, the American and British inquiries collected testimony from survivors and gathered whatever documentation could be salvaged. Newspapers around the world published lists of the dead and missing, often based on information from survivors and the White Star Line. These lists were not always consistent, and it took years of research to establish a reasonably accurate count. Modern historians have used multiple sources, including original ticket records, family correspondence, and survivor accounts, to refine the list of people on the Titanic to a degree that was impossible in 1912.

Demographics and Statistics
