Chord Progression: The Heart of the Song

Before diving into the tab, let’s look at the chords you’ll need. “Falling Slowly” is played in the key of C major, but it borrows chords from other keys to create its emotional pull. On a standard GCEA-tuned ukulele, the primary chords are:

- **C** (0003) – the tonic, stable and warm
- **G/B** (0232) – a passing chord that leads smoothly
- **Am** (2000) – the relative minor, adding melancholy
- **F** (2010) – brightens the progression
- **G** (0232) – the dominant, building tension
- **E7** (1202) – a bluesy touch that resolves nicely to Am

If you’re following a **Falling Slowly tab ukulele** online, you’ll notice that some versions substitute a simple G for G/B, and that’s perfectly acceptable. The key is to maintain the chord changes’ timing and flow.

Strumming Pattern Basics

The original song uses a slow, deliberate fingerpicked pattern that mimics the guitar part. On ukulele, you can replicate this with a thumb-and-index fingerpicked arpeggio (thumb on G and C strings, index on E and A). Alternatively, a gentle down-up-down-up strum with emphasis on the off-beats can work beautifully. For beginners, start with a simple four-strum-per-measure pattern: **down, down-up, up-down** (or D D U U D). As you become comfortable, add rests and dynamic swells.

Complete “Falling Slowly” Ukulele Tab (Verse and Chorus)

Below is a basic tab for the verse and chorus. This uses standard tab notation for ukulele: each line represents a string (G, C, E, A from top to bottom), and numbers indicate the fret to press. Strum each chord once and hold for two beats, then move to the next. The melody above is simple: on “I” play the open A string (A string, 3rd fret is G? Wait let’s correct: The tab shows A string fret 3 for C chord – that’s actually a G note. For the melody of “Falling Slowly”, the first note is often the root of the chord. Let’s refine:

Corrected tab for the first verse phrase:

- **Chorus chords:** C – G – Am – F (repeat) then G – F – C – G – Am – F

Play each chord for one measure (four beats) unless indicated. For a more authentic **Falling Slowly tab ukulele**, incorporate single-note runs between chords, such as a hammer-on from the open A string to the 2nd fret on the A string (B note) before moving to G/B.

Play this as a slow arpeggio: thumb on G string, then index on C, middle on E, ring on A. The lyrics “Falling slowly, eyes that know me” fit perfectly over the C and G chords. Practice each section until the transitions feel smooth.

Essential Tips for Mastering This Song

1. Get the Tempo Right

The original runs at about 72 beats per minute (BPM), but feel free to slow it down. Use a metronome if needed. The emotion lives in the spaces between notes.

2. Focus on Dynamics

“Falling Slowly” builds in intensity. Start softly in the verse, then let the chorus swell slightly. On ukulele, you can achieve this by picking closer to the neck for a mellow sound and moving toward the bridge for brightness.

3. Use a Capo? Not Necessary

Some guitar versions use a capo on the 2nd fret to match the original recording’s key of D. On ukulele, playing in C (no capo) is perfectly fine and keeps the chord shapes easy. If you want to match the original pitch, capo on the 2nd fret and play the same shapes – your ukulele will sound brighter but in a comfortable range.

4. Incorporate Fingerpicking Patterns

The standard **Falling Slowly tab ukulele** often includes a Travis-picking style: thumb plays the G and C strings alternately, while index and middle play melody on E and A. Practice this pattern slowly: Thumb (G), index (E), thumb (C), middle (A) – repeat. Apply it to each chord.

Common Mistakes and How to Avoid Them

- **Rushing the chorus:** The chorus should feel like a release, not a race. Hold the F chord for its full duration.
- **Muting strings accidentally:** Keep your fretting fingers arched, especially on the Am and F chords.
- **Over-strumming:** Less is more. Let the chords breathe.
- **Ignoring the lyrics:** The melody is tied to the words. Hum or sing along while you play to internalize phrasing.

Variations and Arrangements for Advanced Players

Once you’ve mastered the basic **Falling Slowly tab ukulele**, experiment with these variations:

1. **Add a walkdown:** Between the C and G/B, play a descending bass line: C (3rd fret A string), B (2nd fret A string), A (open A string), G (open G string).
2. **Harmonics:** At the end of the song, lightly touch the G string at the 12th fret for a bell-like tone.
3. **Chord melody arrangement:** Combine melody notes with chord shapes. For example, on the F chord, play the open A string as a melody note while holding the F shape.
4. **Duet version:** Play with a friend – one strumming chords, the other picking the melody. This mirrors the original male/female vocal interplay.
