Mount Types and Their Significance

Mounts in WoW are broadly categorized by their function. The most common distinction is between **ground mounts** and **flying mounts**. Most zones in the game allow flying once you reach a certain level and unlock the appropriate riding skill. However, newer expansions often restrict flying at launch, making ground mounts essential for the first few months of content. Beyond these, you will find specialized types:

- **Aquatic Mounts:** These allow you to travel faster underwater and, in many cases, breathe indefinitely. They are invaluable in zones like Vashj'ir or when farming underwater treasures.
- **Surface Mounts:** A subset of ground mounts that can also travel on water. Examples include the Water Strider and the Brutosaur, which are incredibly useful for crossing lakes and rivers without dismounting.
- **Dragonriding Mounts:** Introduced in the Dragonflight expansion, these are customizable flying mounts with unique vigor-based

movement mechanics. They represent a major evolution in mount design.

- **Special Mounts:** This includes multi-passenger mounts (like the Grand Expedition Yak), vendor mounts (which allow you to sell items and repair gear on the go), and mail-carrier mounts.

Mount Speed and Riding Skill Tiers

Your mount's speed is directly tied to your riding skill. You can learn these from riding trainers in capital cities. The tiers are straightforward:

1. **Apprentice Riding (Level 10):** Allows you to ride ground mounts at 60% speed. This is your first mount.
2. **Journeyman Riding (Level 20):** Increases ground mount speed to 100%.
3. **Expert Riding (Level 30):** Unlocks flying mounts and allows them to fly at 150% speed.
4. **Artisan Riding (Level 40):** Increases flying mount speed to 280%.
5. **Master Riding (Level 50):** The pinnacle of traditional flying, boosting speed to 310%.

For Dragonriding, you unlock the skill automatically in the Dragon Isles, but you must collect Dragon Glyphs to upgrade your mount's four core abilities. A solid **World of Warcraft Mount Guide** will always remind you to prioritize these skill upgrades early to make your collection efforts much faster.

How to Acquire Your First Mounts

Starting your collection is easier than ever. Modern WoW provides new players with their first mount around level 10 through the introductory quest lines.

Faction-Specific Mounts

Your choice of the Horde or Alliance dictates your earliest mount options. Alliance players typically ride horses, rams, mechanostriders (Gnomes), and sabers (Night Elves). Horde players ride wolves, raptors (Trolls), skeletal horses (Undead), and kodos (Tauren). These can be purchased from stable masters in your racial capital city once you have reached the required reputation with your faction. You can also learn to ride other races' mounts by grinding reputation with their faction, which is a great early goal for any aspiring collector.

Racial Mounts and Reputation

Beyond your own race, you can acquire mounts from other factions. For example, an Orc can eventually ride a Night Elf saber by grinding reputation with the Darnassus faction. Classic reputation mounts are bought from quartermasters in the old world and require a specific reputation level (usually Exalted). This can be a slow process, but modern catch-up mechanics like the Darkmoon Faire and World Quest bonuses have made it significantly faster. This is a cornerstone of any comprehensive **World of Warcraft Mount Guide** because it represents a reliable, grindable path to dozens of mounts.

Endgame and Rare Mounts

This is where the thrill of the hunt truly begins. Some of the most prestigious mounts in the game are locked behind challenging content or incredibly low drop rates.

Dungeon and Raid Mount Drops

Many legacy raids and dungeons contain rare mount drops that you can farm solo on a weekly basis. These are often the most sought-after items in the game due to their unique models and the prestige associated with them. Notable examples include:

- **Invincible:** Drops from the Lich King (Heroic Icecrown Citadel).
- **Mimiron's Head:** Drops from Yogg-Saron (0 Light) in Ulduar.
- **Ashes of Al'ar:** Drops from Kael'thas Sunstrider in The Eye.
- **Fiery Warhorse's Reins:** Drops from Attumen the Huntsman in Karazhan.
- **Timewalking Mounts:** During Timewalking events, you can buy mounts from vendors, such as the Infinite Timereaver.

Farming these mounts requires patience. You can create a weekly lockout schedule using the in-game calendar or addons like Rarity to track your attempts. The drop rate for most of these is around 1%, so persistence is key.

World Boss and Rare Spawn Mounts

Scattered across the continents are rare monsters and world bosses that have a chance to drop unique mounts. These are often camped by many players, making them competitive to secure. Examples include:

- **Poundfist:** Drops the Sunhide Gronnling in Draenor.
- **Time-Lost Proto-Drake:** A rare spawn in Storm Peaks, Northrend.
- **Voidtalon of the Dark Star:** Found from a rare portal spawn in Draenor or the Broken Isles.
- **Galleon and Sha of Anger:** World bosses in Pandaria with mount drops.

Addons that track rare spawn timers and group finder tools can help you secure these mounts, though they often require being logged in at the right time.

Achievement and Meta Mounts

Mounts earned through achievements provide a clear, trackable goal. These are often awarded for completing a series of difficult tasks, often across an entire expansion.

Glory of the Raider Series

Each raid tier has an achievement called "Glory of the [Raid Name] Raider." Completing a specific set of challenging (often quirky or difficult) tasks within the raid rewards a unique mount. For example:

- **Glory of the Ulduar Raider:** Rewards the Ironbound Proto-Drake.
- **Glory of the Icecrown Raider:** Rewards the Bloodbathed Frostbrood Vanquisher.
- **Glory of the Dragon Soul Raider:** Rewards the Experiment 12-B.

These achievements can often be done on a lower difficulty or with a small group if you are over-leveled, making them accessible to solo collectors.

Exploration and Questing Achievements

Some mounts are rewarded for thorough exploration. The "Loremaster" achievement chain rewards a mount after completing all quests in a specific continent. Similarly, the "Explore" achievements for each expansion often yield a mount or pet. A notable example is the **Flying Mount** reward from the "Pathfinder" achievements in Warlords of Draenor, Battle for Azeroth, and Shadowlands, which unlocked flying in those zones. While Pathfinder is no longer required for flying in older zones, completing it still awards the associated mount.

Special Event and Promotional Mounts

World of Warcraft has a rich history of seasonal events and promotions that offer exclusive mounts. These are often time-sensitive, so marking your calendar is essential.

Holiday Events

Major real-world holidays are celebrated in Azeroth with unique boss encounters and quests that can reward mounts.

- **Brewfest (September/October):** You can obtain the Swift Brewfest Ram and the Great Brewfest Kodo from the Coren Direbrew boss.
- **Hallow's End (October/November):** The Headless Horseman drops the Horseman's Reins, a flaming horse mount.
- **Love is in the Air (February):** The Love Rocket mount drops from the Crown Chemical Co. boss, and it has one of the lowest drop rates in the game (under 1%).
- **Feast of Winter Veil (December/January):** The Grinch-like boss gives a chance to drop the Big Blizzard Bear, though it is rare.

Trading Post and Promotions

The Trading Post, introduced in Dragonflight, allows you to earn Trader's Tender by completing monthly activities. These can be spent on an ever-rotating selection of mounts, including past promotional items, store mounts, and exclusive recolors. Keep an eye on the monthly log-in reward, as it often includes a free mount for subscribers. Additionally, Blizzard periodically offers mounts as part of promotions, such as purchasing a six-month subscription or attending BlizzCon (virtually or in person).

PvP Mounts and Warfront Rewards

For those who prefer the battlefield to the dungeon, PvP offers a rich source of unique mounts. These are typically awarded based on your PvP rating or through PvP currency.
