Retina Display and Pixel Density: Why 326 PPI Matters

Apple coined the term "Retina Display" with the iPhone 4 to describe a screen with a pixel density high enough that the human eye cannot discern individual pixels at a typical viewing distance. For users who value clarity and readability, the iPhone 5 display was a major selling point. It proved that a larger screen did not have to come at the cost of sharpness, a concern that some users had when hearing about the switch from the 3.5-inch form factor. The combination of the 4-inch diagonal and 326 PPI gave the iPhone 5 a total pixel count that felt modern and premium at the time of release.

Implications for App Developers and Designers

The introduction of the 1136 x 640 resolution had significant implications for developers and designers. Prior to the iPhone 5, most iOS apps were designed for a 960 x
