Bruce Spence as Lord Rhoop

Bruce Spence, known for his distinctive features and roles in *Mad Max* and *The Lord of the Rings*, appears as the tormented Lord Rhoop. He is one of the lost lords, discovered on the Dark Island. Spence delivers a hauntingly memorable performance, conveying despair and fractured sanity. His character's warning about the island adds a chilling layer to the film's climax.

The Seven Lords: Supporting Cast Highlights
