9. Making direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.
10. Continuing to take personal inventory and when we were wrong, promptly admitting it.

11. Seeking through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.
12. Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to others and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

While the language is traditional, many modern recovery communities rephrase the steps to be inclusive of all belief systems.
