Foods You Must Avoid (The "No" List)

This is where the program gets serious. The following food groups are completely

eliminated for thirty days:

1. **Added Sugar and Sweeteners:** This includes maple syrup, honey, agave nectar, coconut sugar, stevia, monk fruit, and artificial sweeteners like Splenda and Equal. You are also required to read labels to avoid hidden sugars like dextrose, fructose, and maltodextrin.
2. **Grains:** All grains are off-limits. This includes wheat, barley, oats, corn, rice, quinoa, buckwheat, and amaranth. This also means no bread, pasta, cereal, or tortillas.
3. **Legumes:** This category includes beans of all kinds (black, kidney, pinto), lentils, chickpeas, peanuts, peanut butter, and soy products (tofu,

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tempeh, edamame, soy sauce). The only exception is green beans, snow peas, and sugar snap peas, which are botanically legumes but are treated as vegetables in the program.

4. **Dairy:** All cow, goat, and sheep milk products are banned. This includes milk, cheese, yogurt, cream, and butter. The sole exception is ghee (clarified butter) because the milk proteins have been removed.
5. **Alcohol:** No alcohol of any kind is permitted. This includes wine, beer, spirits, and even cooking wines.
6. **Certain Additives:** Carrageenan, MSG, and sulfites are banned. You must check labels carefully.
7. **Baked Goods and "Paleo-ified" Treats:** Even if they are made with

compliant ingredients, you cannot recreate your favorite treats (like paleo pancakes, banana bread, or brownies). The program aims to break your psychological dependence on "foods with no brakes."
