Devotions and Feasts Honoring the Mother of the Redeemer

The Church has established various feasts and devotions that highlight Mary's identity as Mother of the Redeemer. In his encyclical *Redemptoris Mater* (Mother of the Redeemer), he wrote extensively about her presence in the life of the Church and her

unique participation in the mystery of Christ. This encyclical, published in 1987, remains a foundational document for understanding the Church's teaching on **Mary Mother Of The Redeemer**. It explores her faith, her pilgrimage of hope, and her presence at Pentecost, when she prayed with the apostles for the coming of the Holy Spirit.

Key Church Teachings on Mary's Role in Redemption
