The Science Behind Photosynthesis: A Quick Refresher

Photosynthesis occurs in two main stages. The **light-dependent reactions** take place in the thylakoid membranes of the chloroplast. Here, chlorophyll and other pigments absorb sunlight. Through a series of reactions, the carbon is reduced to form G3P (glyceraldehyde-3-phosphate), which is then used to synthesize glucose (C6H12O6) and other organic molecules. The cycle also regenerates the initial CO2 acceptor molecule, RuBP.
