While Norton and Bedford offer more selections and deeper contextual essays, the Portable Anthology wins on cost and convenience. It is an ideal choice for courses that meet only one or two days per week and where the instructor prefers to supplement with additional texts.

Limitations

No anthology is perfect, and the second edition has some limitations worth noting. First, because it is compact, the number of selections per genre is limited. Instructors who want to teach a wide range of short stories, for instance, may find the thirty-some stories insufficient and will need to assign additional readings from other sources. Second, the poetry section, while diverse, lacks extensive coverage of non-English language poets in translation (only a handful are included). Third, the drama section does not include more experimental or contemporary plays beyond the 1990s (with the exception of *Fences*, first performed in 1985). Finally, the writing instruction chapter, while helpful, is somewhat basic and may not satisfy composition instructors who prefer more rigorous rhetoric. Despite these critiques, the anthology remains a solid foundation for an introductory course.

Where to Find the 2nd Edition Today

Since the 2nd edition is out of print (later editions, such as the 3rd and 4th, are available), you can often find used copies online through sites like Amazon, eBay, or AbeBooks. Many college bookstores also sell used copies at reduced prices. If you are an instructor considering it, check that the 2nd edition still matches your syllabus; some readings have been cut in later editions, and the order of contents changes. For students on a tight budget, the 2nd edition offers tremendous value for a few dollars. Libraries may also hold

copies for reserve.
