The Unprecedented Rushing Impact

What truly made the **Robert Griffin III career stats** from 2012 legendary were his contributions on the ground. He rushed 120 times for 815 yards and 7 touchdowns. His 6.8 yards per carry average is the highest in NFL history for a quarterback with at least 100 rushing attempts in a single season. This was not just scrambling; this was designed running. He consistently broke off long runs, serving as a primary weapon in the running game.

This dual-threat capability led to a total of 4,015 yards of offense (3,200 passing + 815 rushing) and 27 total touchdowns (20 passing + 7 rushing). He became the first rookie in NFL history to pass for over 3,000 yards and rush for over 800 yards. He also set the single-season NFL record for rushing yards by a rookie quarterback, a record that stood until it was broken by Lamar Jackson. His 2012 season remains a

The 2013 Season: A Statistical Shift

The 2013 season serves as a sharp contrast in the overall picture of **Robert Griffin III career stats**. After recovering from a torn ACL and LCL suffered in the playoffs, Griffin returned for the 2013 season, but the player was statistically different.

He started 13 games, completing 274 of 456 passes for 3,203 yards. While his passing yardage was similar to his rookie year, the efficiency dropped significantly. He threw 16 touchdowns and 12 interceptions, with a passer rating of 82.2. His completion percentage fell to 60.1%.

The "read-option" heavy scheme was somewhat curtailed due to injury concerns, and defenses had a full offseason of film to study. The explosive, improvisational magic was less frequent. This season demonstrated that the complete package seen in 2012 required both physical health and scheme novelty. Cleveland Browns (2016)

After missing the entire 2015 season, Griffin signed with the Cleveland Browns. The 2016 season was his last as a primary starter. He played in 5 games (starting 5), completing 87 of 147 passes for 886 yards, 2 touchdowns, and 3 interceptions. He also rushed for 190 yards and 2 touchdowns on 31 carries. His passer rating of 72.5 was a career low for a season with starts.

This stint was marked by another significant shoulder injury (a fractured coracoid bone) that ended his season early. The experience in Cleveland was a difficult chapter in the **Robert Griffin III career stats**, as he was unable to provide the stability the franchise desperately needed.

Baltimore Ravens (2018-2020)

Griffin's final NFL stops were with the Baltimore Ravens, where he served as a backup to Lamar Jackson. His role changed completely. He was no longer a franchise quarterback but a veteran presence and a spot starter. In three seasons with the Ravens, he played in 11 games and started 1.

His stats in Baltimore were minimal but efficient in a small sample size: 7 completions on 11 attempts for 101 yards and 1 touchdown, along with 39 rushing yards on 11 carries. In that game, he completed 10 of 19 passes for 84 yards and 2 interceptions, with a passer rating of 24.0. He rushed 5 times for 21 yards. This game is a statistical footnote, but it is a crucial part of the narrative, as the knee injury he suffered in this game effectively altered the course of his career.

The Semantics of a Statistical Legacy
