Essential Supplies for Safe and Comfortable Neti Pot Use

Mix $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ **teaspoon of non-iodized salt** with 8 ounces (240 ml) of lukewarm water. Add a pinch of baking soda (about $\frac{1}{8}$ teaspoon) to buffer the pH and make the solution more comfortable. Stir until completely dissolved. Pre-packaged saline

packets are also available for convenience.

3. Gather a Clean Neti Pot

Wash your neti pot with warm soapy water after each use and dry thoroughly. Many pots are dishwasher-safe. Replace plastic pots every few months if they show scratches where bacteria can hide.

Step-by-Step Guide: How to Use Neti Pot

Now let's walk through the actual process. Find a comfortable position at a sink. Stand with your head

tilted forward and slightly to one side. It may help to practice over a sink until you feel confident.

Step 1: Fill the Neti Pot with Saline Solution

Pour the prepared lukewarm saline into your clean neti pot. Ensure the solution is not too hot or too cold – test a drop on the inside of your wrist.

Step 2: Position Your Head

Tilt your head forward at about a 45-degree angle, then turn it to the left so that your right nostril is pointing upward. The idea is to create a straight path for the water to flow through the nasal

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cavity and out the left nostril.

of your throat – just spit it out.

Step 3: Insert the Spout

Gently place the neti pot spout into your right nostril. It should create a light seal, but do not jam it in. There should be no discomfort.

Step 5: Allow Drainage

Continue until about half the solution is used. Then remove the pot, gently blow your nose to clear any remaining water and mucus, and repeat on the other side: tilt your head to the right and pour into the left nostril.

Step 4: Tilt the Pot and Breathe Through Your Mouth

Slowly tilt the neti pot upward so the water flows into your right nostril. Breathe calmly through your open mouth. The water will flow through your nasal passages and exit the left nostril. Do not worry if some water trickles down the back

Step 6: Finish and Clean Up

Once finished, gently blow your nose again. Do not forcefully blow, as this could push water into the Eustachian tubes. Rinse your neti pot thoroughly with hot soapy water and allow

it to air dry.

Tips for First-Time Users

- **Use lukewarm water** – extreme temperatures can cause dizziness or discomfort.

4. **Not cleaning the pot** – bacteria can build up. Wash after every use.
5. **Using cold water** – cold water can cause sinus shock and

How Often Should You Use a Neti Pot?

The frequency depends on your needs. For acute sinusitis or severe allergies, using the neti pot twice a day can be helpful. For chronic congestion or maintenance, once a day is often sufficient. When you feel a cold coming on, you can increase use to three times daily. However, overuse (more than four times a day long-term) can strip protective mucus and cause dryness. Listen to your body.

Precautions and When to Avoid Neti Pot Use

While neti pots are generally safe, certain conditions require caution or avoidance:

- **Ear infections or blocked Eustachian tubes** – irrigating can force water into the middle ear.
