Getting Started: The Essentials of Sonic Unleashed on Wii

The levels are shorter, the camera is adjusted, and the controls rely heavily on the Wii Remote and Nunchuk.

Understanding the Controls

- **Movement:** Use the Control Stick on the Nunchuk to move Sonic or the Werehog.

- **Spin Dash/Attack:** Shake the Nunchuk or press the Z button to charge a Spin Dash. During Werehog stages, shaking the Wii

Remote performs a standard attack combo.

- **Quick Step/Grind:** Tilt the Wii Remote left or right to quick step. This is essential for dodging obstacles and collecting rings on narrow pathways.
- **Sonic Boost:** Once you collect enough rings, shake the Wii Remote to activate the Sonic Boost. This consumes rings rapidly but provides a massive speed increase and allows you to break through certain barriers.

Hub Worlds: Hub vs. Mazuri

The game features several hub worlds, including Apotos, Spagonia, and Chun-nan. Unlike the HD versions, these hubs are less sprawling but still contain numerous side quests and hidden items. Speaking of which, let's address the elephant in the room. The **Sonic Unleashed Wii guide** community often discusses the structure of these hubs. You will find villagers who offer missions for experience points, food items to boost your stats, and, most importantly, Medals.

Medal Mania: Collecting Sun and Moon Medals

The progression system in **Sonic Unleashed** is tied directly to collecting Sun Medals and Moon Medals. Sun Medals unlock Day Stages (the fast Sonic levels), while Moon Medals unlock Night Stages (the Werehog levels). Running out of medals is the most common roadblock for players.

Where to Find Sun Medals

Sun Medals are often found in plain sight, but some require a sharp eye. Here are the best farming strategies:

- **Day Stages:** Always take the alternate paths. If you see a glint of light off the main path, it is likely a Sun Medal.
- **Hub Exploration:** Check behind buildings, on rooftops, and in alleyways. In Apotos, look for the rooftops accessible via grind rails.
- **Side Quests:** Many townsfolk will reward you with Sun Medals for completing simple tasks like fetching items or beating a timer.

Strategies for Moon Medals

Moon Medals are significantly easier to spot, as they glow with a distinct blue aura. They are almost exclusively found at night or in Werehog-specific areas.

- **Break Everything:** The Werehog is strong. Smash every box, crate, and light post you see. Moon Medals are frequently hidden

inside breakable objects.

- **Revisit Hubs:** Make sure to return to previous hub worlds at night. New Moon Medals often appear after you complete a story chapter.
- **Werehog Stages:** Explore every nook and cranny. The combat arenas often have hidden alcoves containing these crucial items.

Day Stages: Reaching Top Speed

The Day Stages are what Sonic does best: pure, unadulterated speed. The Wii version features levels like Windmill Isle, Savannah Citadel, and Dragon Road. Here is how to conquer them.

The Key to S-Ranks

Achieving an S-Rank on a Day Stage requires three things: speed, rings collected, and enemies defeated (or avoided). However, time is the most significant factor.

1. **Know the Route:** Memorize the layout. Using the Sonic Boost at the wrong time can send you flying into a bottomless pit.
2. **Chain Your Boosts:** Try to maintain a high ring count. Every 20 rings allows you to boost. Using the boost at the apex of a jump gives you incredible distance.
3. **Utilize the Homing Attack:** Quickly tap the attack button while in the air to home in on enemies and springs. This keeps your momentum going.

Ring Management

Rings are your lifeline. If you get hit, you lose your rings. If you get hit with zero rings, you die instantly.

- **Don't Hoard:** If you have a full ring gauge (over 100), use your boost to break through barriers. You will pick up more rings immediately after.
- **Safety First:** In tight areas with lots of enemies, it is often better to slow down slightly and pick off threats with the Homing Attack rather than boosting through them blindly.

Night Stages: Mastering the Werehog

The Werehog sections are the most controversial part of the game, but they are far from unplayable. On the Wii, the combat is functional and can be quite satisfying once you understand the rhythm. Consider this your essential **Sonic Unleashed Wii guide** for the nocturnal brawler.

Combat Combos and Strategies

The Werehog has several combos, and using the right one for the right situation is vital.

- **Ground Pound:** Press A in the air while holding down to slam the ground. This is excellent for breaking shields and stunning groups of enemies.
- **Claw Swipe (Shake Remote):** Your bread and butter. Mash this to clear out basic enemies.
- **Yo-Yo (Shake Nunchuk):** This grabs distant enemies and pulls them to you. It is fantastic for dealing with ranged attackers like the Dark Bat.
- **Cyclone Combo:** Press Z to block, then shake both the Remote and Nunchuk simultaneously. This performs a spinning attack that hits everything around you.

Platforming as the Werehog

The Werehog is slow, but he has unique abilities for platforming.

- **Stretch Jump:** Point the Wii Remote at the screen and press A to grab ledges far away. This is essential for reaching high platforms.
- **Wall Climbing:** You can climb specific textured walls. Simply jump at them and push the Control Stick upward. Shake the remote to climb faster.
- **Puzzle Solving:** Many Night Stages involve pushing blocks or pulling levers. Take your time; there is no timer penalty in these sections.

Upgrades and Progression

Your performance in stages earns you Experience Points (EXP). As you level up, you unlock new abilities and stat boosts.

Leveling Up Sonic

Sonic's upgrades are mostly passive, such as increased ring capacity, faster boost recovery, and higher jump height. Focus on leveling up the **Ring Gauge** first. A larger ring gauge means you can boost longer and survive more hits.

Leveling Up the Werehog

The Werehog relies heavily on active abilities. Prioritize the following upgrades:

- **Combo Power:** Increases the damage of your standard attacks.
- **Health Gauge:** The Werehog takes a lot of damage. More health is always better.
- **Unleash Mode:** This is the Werehog's version of the Sonic Boost. It makes you temporarily invincible and massively increases damage. Level this up as soon as possible.

Cooking and Food Bonuses

Throughout the hub worlds, you can purchase food from vendors. Eating food permanently increases one of your stats.

- **Ice Cream:** Increases your Ring Gauge.
- **Steak:** Increases the Werehog's Health.
- **Sushi:** Increases your Speed stat.

Make sure to buy and eat every food item you can. The stat boosts are small but cumulative, and they make a significant difference in the final stages of the game.

Boss Battles: Tips for Victory

The boss fights in **Sonic Unleashed** are large-scale spectacles. Here is a quick breakdown of how to handle the major encounters.

Fighting Dark Gaia Phoenix

This fiery bird is encountered in the sky. You must chase it through a linear stage, dodging fireballs and boosting into its wings. **Pro Tip:** Save your boost for the straightaways. Use the Homing Attack to latch onto the weak points on its body.

The Egg Dragoon

This mech battle occurs in two phases. During the first phase, you play as Sonic. Hit the boosters on its legs to stun it, then attack the cockpit. In the second phase, you play as the Werehog. Grab the missiles it fires and throw them back at its face.

Perfect Dark Gaia

The final boss is a screen-filling nightmare. This fight is mostly about endurance. You will automatically move forward. Focus on dodging the hands and tentacles that reach from the background. When you see a glowing orb, attack it. This battle is a test of your reflexes and your ring management. Do not panic.

Common Pitfalls and How to Avoid Them

Even experienced players can get tripped up. Here are the most common mistakes made while playing the Wii version of **Sonic Unleashed** and how to avoid them.

- **Ignoring Medals:** Do not rush through the story. If you get stuck, go back to previous levels and hubs to farm medals. You will need roughly 60 Sun Medals and 40 Moon Medals to unlock the final story stage.
- **Button Mashing:** The Werehog sections require timing. If you just shake the remote wildly, you will perform weak attacks and leave yourself open to counter-attacks. Learn the combo rhythms.
- **Skipping Side Quests:** Those optional missions in the hub worlds are not just filler. They provide EXP, medals, and food. Avoid skipping them.
- **Forgetting to Save:** The Wii version has specific save points. If you quit without reaching a save point, you will lose your progress. Always look for the glowing checkpoint flags.

Camera Control

The camera can be your enemy. In Day Stages, the camera is mostly automated, but in Night Stages, you can adjust it. Use the D-Pad on the Wii Remote to re-center the camera behind the Were
