Two-Syllable Perfect Rhymes (With Stress on the Final Syllable)

- Adored:** To be loved deeply and intensely. A very emotional and positive rhyme. Example: "The teacher was adored by the board of education."
- Ignored:** To be refused to pay attention to. A common word that speaks to neglect or dismissal. Example: "The warning on the board was completely ignored."
- Outpoured:** To be flowed out rapidly and in abundance. Often used for emotions or liquids. Example: "His feelings were outpoured after he read the board message."
- Implored:** To be begged earnestly or desperately. A dramatic and passionate word. Example: "The villagers implored the board to reconsider."

Near Rhymes and Slant Rhymes: The Flexible Friends

Not every rhyme needs to be perfect. Near rhymes, also called slant rhymes, half rhymes, or imperfect rhymes, share similar but not identical sounds. They are incredibly useful for songwriters and poets who want to avoid a sing-song quality or need more flexibility. Words with the "UR" or "ARR" Sound Variations

These are slightly less common but still effective for slant rhymes.

- Hard:** Solid, firm, or difficult. Example: "The test was hard, just like the board he sat on."
- Guard:** To protect or watch over. Example: "The guard stood by the notice board."
