Unlike traditional autoloaders (like the French AMX 50B or American T57 Heavy) that fire a full clip and then suffer a long, painful reload, the Italian autoreloader works more like a hybrid. It allows you to fire shells individually while the rest of the magazine reloads one shell at a time.

Tier I to IV: The Early Grind

The hull armor becomes more effective, and the cannons gain better penetration values. However, the true star of these tiers is the **P.43 ter** at Tier VII. This tank is a beast in the right hands, with a powerful 90mm cannon and decent mobility. However, the crown jewel is the Tier X **Carro Armato P. 88 (Progetto 65)**. This tank is the ultimate expression of the Italian philosophy. Playstyle: How to

Mastering the Autoreloader Rhythm

The most important skill to learn is managing your magazine. Never empty your clip unless you are certain you can secure a kill or a safe retreat. A good rule of thumb is to always keep at least one shell loaded. If you dump all three shells, you become a sitting duck for the next 20+ seconds. Practice the flow: fire one shot, retreat, wait for the shell to load, fire again. This "one shell at a time" rhythm is the default state of a skilled Italian tanker.

Use Mobility to Your Advantage

Italian tanks are typically very fast, especially in the medium lines. You should constantly be looking for opportunities to relocate. If the enemy is pushing a flank hard, use your speed to fall back and support. If a tank on your team is spotting, use your speed to get into a hull-down position that your armor can handle. Mobility is your second-best friend, right after your autoreloader.

Armor Awareness: Know

Your Limits **Succeed with Italian**

With the exception of the turret on the Progetto 65, most Italian tanks have poor hull armor. You cannot trade shots with Soviet heavies or German super-heavies. You must rely on your gun depression to hide your hull and only expose your turret. When you can't do that, you must use your speed to dodge incoming fire. Never sit still. Keep your tank moving to make yourself a harder target.

Support Role vs. Flanker

Italian tanks are not frontline brawlers. Your role is a **support flanker**. Stay near your heavies to provide fire support, but be ready to sweep around the enemy flank when they are distracted. Your burst damage can finish off wounded enemies quickly. In the late game, your mobility and autoreloader make you a terrifying assassin. You can clean up isolated enemies with ease.

Pros and Cons of the Italian Line

- **Autoreloader flexibility:** Unmatched ability to adapt between sustained damage and burst damage.

Crew Skills Priority

1. **Sixth Sense (Commander):** Absolutely essential for knowing when you are spotted.
2. **Brothers in Arms (All):** A 5% boost to all crew skills.
3. **Repairs (All):** Keeps you in the fight longer.
4. **Smooth Ride and Snap Shot:** Improve accuracy while moving and traversing the turret.
