The Magic Words of Politeness

These are among the most important **common Italian words** you will ever use. Use them liberally.

- **Grazie** (GRAHT-see-eh): Thank you. The most essential word.
- **Grazie mille** (GRAHT-see-eh MEEL-leh): Thank you very much (literally "a thousand thanks").
- **Prego** (PREH-goh): You're welcome. Also means "please" (after you) or "go ahead".
- **Per favore** (pair fah-VOH-reh): Please. Use this when asking for anything.
- **Per piacere** (pair pyah-CHEH-reh): Please (another common variation).
- **Mi scusi** (mee SKOO-zee): Excuse me / I'm sorry (formal). Use this to get someone's attention or apologize.
- **Scusa** (SKOO-zah): Excuse me / Sorry (informal).

- **Il conto, per favore.** (eel KOHN-toh, pair fah-VOH-reh): The bill, please.

Italian coffee culture is specific. Avoid ordering a "latte" (which means milk). Instead, try these:

- **Un caffè** (oon kahf-FEH): An espresso. This is the standard coffee order.
- **Un cappuccino** (oon kahp-poo-CHEE-noh): A cappuccino. Note: Italians typically only drink cappuccinos in the morning, never after a meal.
- **Un acqua naturale/frizzante** (oon AHK-wah nah-too-RAH-leh/freet-ZAHN-teh): Still/sparkling water.
- **Posso avere un bicchiere d'acqua?** (POH-soh ah-VEH-reh oon bee-KYEH-reh DAHK-wah): Can I have a glass of water?

Part 3: Getting Around - Directions and Transportation

Asking for and Understanding Directions

- **Scusi, quando parte il treno per [Firenze]?** (SKOO-zee, KWAHN-doh PAHR-teh eel TREH-noh pair [Fee-REN-tseh]): Excuse me, when does the train for [Florence] leave?

Part 4: Shopping and Transactions

From buying leather goods in Florence to sampling cheese in a local market, knowing **essential Italian vocabulary** for purchases is vital.

- **Quanto costa?** (KWAHN-toh KOH-stah): How much does it cost?
- **Quanto viene?** (KWAHN-toh VYEH-neh): How much does it come to? (Another common way to ask the price).
- **Posso pagare con la carta?** (POH-soh pah-GAH-reh kohn lah KAHR-tah): Can I pay with a card?
- **Contanti** (kohn-TAHN-tee): Cash.

- **Posso guardare?** (POH-soh gwahr-DAH-reh): Can I look around? (Useful if you don't want assistance immediately).
- **Grazie, è perfetto.** (GRAHT-see-eh, eh pehr-FEHT-toh): Thank you, it's perfect.
