Opening Hours and Admission

Strawberry Field is open year-round, but hours vary by season. The **Strawberry Fields Liverpool map** and the official website provide up-to-date information. Typically:

- April to October:** 9:30 am to 5:00 pm (last admission 4:00 pm).
- November to March:** 10:00 am to 4:00 pm (last admission 3:00 pm).
- Closed:** Christmas Day, Boxing Day, and New Year’s Day.

Now owned by the National Trust, it is preserved exactly as it was in the 1950s. Tours must be booked in advance, and the **Strawberry Fields Liverpool map** often includes this as a recommended extension. Seeing both locations on the same day gives an unparalleled insight into John’s early life.

Woolton Village and St. Peter’s Church

Woolton village is a picturesque suburb with a village green, historic buildings, and excellent pubs. St. Peter’s Church, just a five-minute walk from Strawberry Field, was where John Lennon first met Paul McCartney at a church fête on July 6, 1957. The churchyard is also the resting place of John’s mother, Julia. The **Strawberry Fields Liverpool map** will guide you to these locations, making it easy to create a self-guided walking tour.

Penny Lane

Penny Lane is another iconic Beatles location, immortalised in the song of the same name. It is about a 10-minute drive or 30-minute walk from Strawberry Field.
