- **Extractor and extractor spring:** Claws onto the cartridge rim to eject spent casings.

### Magazine Assembly

The magazine is a detachable box that feeds cartridges into the chamber. Parts include the magazine body, follower, spring, and base plate. Occasionally, the magazine catch notch may wear out, requiring a new magazine or replacement of the catch itself.

## How to Read a Bersa Thunder 380 Parts Diagram

Most parts diagrams use an exploded view where each component is drawn separated from its assembly but aligned to show its position. Numbers or letters often correspond to a parts list with descriptions and part numbers. ## Step-by-Step Disassembly Using the Parts Diagram

Below is a basic field-strip process for the Bersa Thunder 380, with reference to the parts diagram to help you identify each piece:

1. **Ensure the firearm is unloaded:** Remove the magazine, lock the slide back, and inspect the chamber.
2. **Release the slide:** Pull the slide slightly rearward and lift the takedown lever (located on the left side above the trigger guard). Allow the slide to move forward and off the frame.
3. **Remove the recoil spring assembly:** On the diagram, you will see the recoil spring (often a flat wire spring) and the guide rod. Lift it out of the slide.

For complete disassembly of the grip frame (including trigger and sear), you may need to remove the grip panels and drive out the trigger pin and hammer pin. An exploded diagram is especially helpful here to show the order of the trigger bar, sear, hammer, and their respective springs.

- **Losing orientation:** When disassembling, lay out parts in the order shown on the diagram. This makes reassembly intuitive.
- **Over-tightening screws:** Grip screws and sight screws can strip. The
