While you can read them after finishing the main series, they are best enjoyed after you are familiar with Alex's journey, as they often reference characters and missions from the longer books.

The Companion: The Alex Rider: Mission Files (2008)

This is a non-fiction companion guide filled with profiles of characters, gadget specifications, and mission briefings. It is a treat for dedicated fans but is not essential to the narrative. It can be read at any point after finishing the first few books.

Graphic Novel Adaptations

Many of the early novels were adapted into graphic novels by Anthony Horowitz and various artists, including the incredible Kanako Damerum and Yuzuru Takasaki. **Stormbreaker** (2006), **Point Blanc** (2007), and **Skeleton Key** (2009) have graphic novel versions that are faithful to the source material. These are a fantastic way to re-experience the stories or for visual learners to enter the series for the first time.
