The Screenshot App (The Visual Approach)

Capturing a Selected Portion

Capturing a Specific Window

If you want to capture just one application window—such as a browser window or a settings panel—the window capture method is ideal. First, press **Command + Shift + 4**. The cursor will become a crosshair. Now, without clicking or dragging, tap the **Spacebar**. The crosshair will turn into a small camera icon. Move this camera icon over the window you want to capture. The window will be highlighted in blue, indicating it is selected. Click the mouse or trackpad, and the screenshot will be taken, including the window's drop shadow and rounded corners. My Screenshots Are Not Saving to the Desktop

If you take a screenshot and do not see a file on your desktop, it is likely that the save location has been changed. As mentioned earlier, this can be adjusted in the Screenshot app's Options menu. Open the Screenshot app with **Command + Shift + 5**, click "Options," and check what is selected under "Save to." It might be set to "Clipboard" or "Mail." To restore the default, simply select "Desktop." Alternatively, if you use a tool like Clipboard, you can paste the screenshot directly into a document or image editor. If the issue persists, check your desktop for hidden files or ensure your desktop is not overflowing with items, as macOS can sometimes struggle to create new files in a full location.
