- **Anna Chancellor as Caroline Bingley:** Chancellor portrays Darcy's scheming, snobbish female counterpart with icy precision. Her barely concealed jealousy and catty remarks make her a delicious villain.
- **Adrian Lukis as Mr. Wickham:** Lukis is wonderfully charismatic and dangerously charming as Wickham. He makes it easy to see why everyone, including Elizabeth, initially trusts him, while also conveying the underlying dishonesty and selfishness that ultimately undo him.

Mr. and Mrs. Gardiner and Charlotte Lucas

The Gardiners, played by **Tim Wylton** and **Penny Downie**, provide a much-needed dose of sense and sophistication. Their gentle guidance and genuine affection for Elizabeth are touching. **Lucy Scott** as Charlotte Lucas gives a quietly heartbreaking performance as a practical woman who marries the ridiculous Mr. Collins for security, making the viewer feel both sympathy and admiration for her difficult choice.

Why the Cast Works So Well Together: Chemistry and Direction
