Step-by-Step SKS Disassembly Guide

Phase 1: Removing the Magazine

Phase 2: Separating the Upper Handguard and Gas Tube

1. Pull the operating rod handle rearward to cock the hammer. Then push the bolt forward slightly to relieve tension on the gas tube.
2. Locate the gas tube retaining screw or lever. On many models, there is a screw on the left side of the gas block. Use a flathead screwdriver to turn it counterclockwise until it stops. Do not remove the screw entirely; just loosen it.
3. Slide the upper handguard forward slightly, then lift it upward and away from the barrel. The gas tube is attached to the handguard. You should now have the entire gas tube assembly in your hands.

Phase 3: Removing the Bolt Carrier and Bolt

1. With the gas tube removed, grasp the operating rod handle and pull it all the way to the rear.
2. While holding it back, lift upward on the rear of the bolt

carrier. The carrier will slide out of the receiver rails.

3. Once the carrier is free, push it forward slightly to separate the bolt from the carrier. Rotate the bolt and remove it from the carrier. You now have two major subassemblies: the bolt carrier group and the bolt itself.

Phase 4: Removing the Trigger Group

This step requires a small punch. The trigger group is retained by a pin through the receiver near the rear of the magazine well.

1. Ensure the hammer is cocked (if it is not, pull the bolt carrier handle to cock it).
2. Insert the punch into the small hole in the trigger guard, just above the pistol grip, and push the retaining pin out from left to right (or vice versa depending on model). The pin may be tight; use light hammer taps if needed.
3. Once the pin is removed, pivot the trigger guard downward and pull the entire trigger assembly out of the receiver. Be careful—the trigger group contains several springs that can pop loose.

Phase 5: Removing the Stock

1. If you plan to clean the barrel or receiver thoroughly, remove the stock. The SKS stock is attached by a cross bolt (on some models) and a rear stock screw.
2. Use a screwdriver to remove the rear screw (located inside the buttplate or under the buttplate). On many SKS models, you also have to remove the tang screw that holds

the receiver tang to the wood.

3. Lift the receiver and barrel out of the stock. The barrel sits in a channel with a metal barrel band that may need to be loosened or slid forward.

After these five phases, you have performed a complete SKS disassembly. Your rifle is now ready for cleaning, inspection, and lubrication. Keep all small parts in a tray. The reverse process constitutes the SKS assembly portion of this guide.

Step-by-Step SKS Assembly Guide

Phase 1: Installing the Stock and Barrel

3. Insert the trigger group retaining pin from the opposite side you removed it. Tap it in until it is flush with the receiver. Ensure the pin passes through the small hole in the trigger group housing.

Phase 3: Installing the Bolt and Bolt Carrier

1. Attach the bolt to the bolt carrier by aligning the bolt's cam pin with the slot in the carrier. Rotate the bolt into place.
2. With the carrier and bolt joined, insert them into the receiver rails. Push the carrier forward until it stops. You may need to tilt the carrier slightly to get it past the hammer.
3. Pull the operating rod handle to the rear, then release it. The carrier should move freely. Do not force it.

Phase 4: Installing the Gas Tube and Upper Handguard

1. Slide the gas tube assembly onto the gas block. Ensure the tube aligns with the gas port on the barrel.
2. Push the handguard rearward until the retaining screw can be tightened. Turn the screw clockwise until snug. Do not overtighten.

Phase 5: Installing the Magazine and Final Checks

1. If you have a detachable magazine, insert it until it clicks. For fixed magazines, ensure the follower moves freely.
2. Perform a function check: cycle the action, dry-fire (with appropriate safety precautions), and ensure the safety operates correctly. Check that the gas tube is secure, the trigger resets, and the bolt locks back on an empty magazine if applicable.
