1. Arithmetic: Fractions and Order of Operations

Sample Question:

Simplify: $\frac{2}{3} \times \left(\frac{1}{4} + \frac{3}{8} \right) \div \frac{5}{6}$

Solution:

First, perform the addition inside the parentheses: $\frac{1}{4} + \frac{3}{8} = \frac{2}{8} + \frac{3}{8} = \frac{5}{8}$.

Now the expression is $\frac{2}{3} \times \frac{5}{8} \div \frac{5}{6}$.

Multiplication and division have equal precedence, so work left to right. Multiply: $\frac{2}{3} \times \frac{5}{8} = \frac{10}{24} = \frac{5}{12}$.

Then divide by $\frac{5}{6}$: $\frac{5}{12} \div \frac{5}{6} = \frac{5}{12} \times \frac{6}{5} = \frac{30}{60} = \frac{1}{2}$.

Answer: $\frac{1}{2}$

Tip: Always follow PEMDAS (Parentheses, Exponents, Multiplication/Division, Addition/Subtraction). Many errors come from rushing the order.

2. Elementary Algebra: Solving Linear Equations

Sample Question:

Solve for x : $5(x - 3) + 2 = 3x + 7$

Solution:

Distribute: $5x - 15 + 2 = 3x + 7 \rightarrow 5x - 13 = 3x + 7$.

Subtract $3x$ from both sides: $2x - 13 = 7$.

Add 13 to both sides: $2x = 20$.

Divide by 2: $x = 10$.

Answer: $x = 10$

Check your answer by plugging back in: $5(10-3)+2 = 5(7)+2 = 35+2=37$ and $3(10)+7=30+7=37$. Works!

3. Intermediate Algebra: Quadratic Equations

Sample Question:

Solve: $x^2 - 5x + 6 = 0$

Solution:

This quadratic factors neatly as $(x - 2)(x - 3) = 0$.

Set each factor to zero: $(x - 2 = 0)$ or $(x - 3 = 0)$.

Thus $(x = 2)$ or $(x = 3)$.

Answer: $(x = 2, 3)$

Alternative method: Use the quadratic formula $x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$ with $(a=1, b=-5, c=6)$. The discriminant is $(25 - 24 = 1)$, giving solutions $(\frac{5 \pm 1}{2})$.

4. Geometry: Area and Perimeter

Sample Question:

A rectangle has a length that is 3 meters longer than its width. If the perimeter is 30 meters, what is the area?

Solution:

Let width = (w) , then length = $(w + 3)$. Perimeter formula: $(2l + 2w = 30)$.

Substitute: $(2(w+3) + 2w = 30) \rightarrow (2w + 6 + 2w = 30) \rightarrow (4w + 6 = 30) \rightarrow (4w = 24) \rightarrow (w = 6)$.

Length = $(6 + 3 = 9)$. Area = length $\times$ width = $(9 \times 6 = 54)$ square meters.

Answer: 54 m²

5. Data Analysis: Mean and Median

Sample Question:

The test scores of five students are 78, 85, 92, 88, and 70. What is the median score?

Solution:

Arrange the scores in ascending order: 70, 78, 85, 88, 92.

The median is the middle value: the third number $\rightarrow$ 85.

Answer: 85

For practice, compute the mean: $\text{sum} = 78+85+92+88+70 = 413$, $\text{mean} = 413 \div 5 = 82.6$. Note that the median (85) differs from the mean because the data set has a low outlier (70).

How to Use Math Placement Test Sample Questions Effectively

Question 7: Linear Inequalities

Solve: $(3 - 2x \leq 7)$

Answer: $(x \geq -2)$ (Subtract 3: $-2x \leq 4$; divide by -2, flip inequality sign: $x \geq -2$)

Question 8: Word Problem (Proportions)

If 5 oranges cost \$2.00, how much would 12 oranges cost?

Answer: \$4.80 (Set up proportion: $5/2 = 12/x \rightarrow$ cross-multiply: $5x = 24 \rightarrow x = 4.8$)

Question 9: Slope of a Line

Find the slope of the line passing through (1, 4) and (3, -2).

Answer: -3 (Slope = $(y_2 - y_1)/(x_2 - x_1) = (-2-4)/(3-1) = -6/2 = -3$)

Question 10: Factoring

Factor completely: $x^3 - 9x$

Answer: $x(x+3)(x-3)$ (First factor out x: $x(x^2 - 9) = x(x-3)(x+3)$)

Common Pitfalls and How to Avoid Them

Even with practice, students fall into predictable traps. Awareness can save you points.

- **Misreading the Question:** Underline key words like “simplify,” “solve,” “evaluate,” or “express in simplest form.” A subtle difference changes the approach.
- **Sign Errors:** Especially with negative numbers and subtractions. Always double-check distribution and sign when moving terms across equals.
- **Forgetting Units:** In geometry and word problems, ensure your final answer includes correct units (square feet, inches, etc.).
- **Overcomplicating:** Many placement test questions test basic concepts. If you find yourself doing heavy calculus, you likely misread the problem.
- **Not Using Scratch Paper:** Doing mental math increases error rates. Use available scratch paper to write down steps clearly.
