The steps connect Piazza di Spagna with the church of Trinità dei Monti, and the whole area is a hub for shopping and people-watching.

Piazza Navona and the Pantheon

Piazza Navona is one of Rome's most beautiful squares, built on the site of a Roman stadium. It is instantly recognizable on a map due to its elongated oval shape. A five-minute walk east brings you to the Pantheon, the best-preserved ancient Roman temple. Its distinctive dome is a clear visual marker. This area is dense with cafes, restaurants, and souvenir shops, making it a perfect place to pause and orient yourself.
