- **Infiltrator:** The stealth sniper. Infiltrators use Tactical Cloak to become invisible, then strike with a powerful sniper rifle shot. This class rewards patience and precision, especially on higher difficulties.

- **Vanguard:** The high-risk, high-reward biotic charge specialist. Vanguard's close distance instantly with Biotic Charge, then unleash a Nova blast. This playstyle is thrilling but requires careful management of shields and cooldowns.

The Rachni Queen

Whether you spared the Rachni Queen in **Mass Effect** affects your options here. If you saved her, she appears again, and you can choose to trust her or hand her over to the Reapers. Trusting her grants valuable rachni war assets. If you originally killed her, a substitute appears that is actually a Reaper clone. Choosing to trust the fake results in negative war assets, so a **Mass Effect 3 Guide** advises caution if you did not save the original queen.

A good strategy is to kite them while layering damage-over-time effects like Incinerate and Warp. Brutes are tough but slow—focus fire on their armor with armor-piercing ammo and heavy weapons.

Geth: The Synthetic Collective

If you encounter geth forces (depending on your choices), they include shielded troopers, rocket troopers, and devastating Primes. Geth are weak to tech powers like Overload and Energy Drain. Sabotage is particularly effective, causing geth to overheat and attack each other. Always destroy the Geth Turrets first, as they provide covering fire for ground troops. Use a sniper rifle or a high-damage pistol to pick off weaker units before engaging primes.

Squad Management and Synergy

Your squadmates in **Mass Effect 3** are not just bystanders; they are powerful allies whose abilities complement your own. War Assets and Galactic Readiness

The concept of war assets is central to the final mission in **Mass Effect 3**.
