Introduced for the 2002 model year, the **Mazda Protégé5** (often stylized as Protégé5 or P5) was the showstopper of the lineup. Exterior Styling: Aggressive and Purposeful

The chassis, already praised for its rigidity, was enhanced with stiffer springs and dampers. The steering was quick and communicative, and the car felt eager to change direction. Performance at its Core:

The Mazdaspeed Protégé

If the Protégé5 was the stylish athlete, the **Mazdaspeed Protégé** was the pure racer. Introduced for the 2003 model year, this was Mazda's first factory-tuned performance car to wear the Mazdaspeed badge in North America. It was a direct response to the Subaru Impreza WRX and the Ford Focus SVT, but it retained the affordable spirit of the standard Protégé.

The Turbocharged Heart

The defining difference of the Mazdaspeed Protégé was its engine. It used a modified version of the 2.0-liter FS-DE engine, now fitted with a Garrett T25 turbocharger. This forced induction system pushed output to a factory-rated **170 horsepower** and **160 lb-ft of torque**. The engine delivered a strong, linear surge of power, completely changing the character of the car. The standard Protégé was fun; the Mazdaspeed was genuinely fast. It came exclusively with a 5-speed manual transmission, reinforcing its driver-focused intent.

Mazda didn't just slap a turbo on the engine and call it a day. The Mazdaspeed Protegé received a comprehensive chassis upgrade. It featured a stiffer suspension with Tokico struts and springs, larger stabilizer bars, and a quicker steering ratio. To handle the extra power and improve stopping performance, Mazda fitted larger disc brakes all around. The exterior was differentiated by a unique front bumper with a larger air intake, a rear spoiler, and exclusive 17-inch Racing Hart alloy wheels. The interior received tasty upgrades like Recaro seats, a leather-wrapped steering wheel, and a unique gauge cluster. It was a complete, cohesive performance package that set a new benchmark for front-wheel-drive compact cars at the time.

Driving Dynamics: The Common Thread

Across the entire **Mazda Protegé Protegé 5 1999 03 Mazdaspeed** lineup, there was one undeniable common thread: excellent driving dynamics. Mazda had mastered the art of making small cars fun. The steering,

Reliability and Common Issues

A major reason for the enduring popularity of these cars is their legendary reliability. The **Mazda Protégé**, in all its forms, is known for being incredibly robust. The 2.0-liter engine is particularly durable, often exceeding 200,000 miles with basic maintenance. 1. **Rust:** The Achilles' heel of these cars. Rear wheel arches, rocker panels, and the area around the rear license plate are prone to rusting, especially in northern climates.

3. **Protegé5 Specific:** The rear hatch struts weaken over time and may fail to hold the hatch open. Also, the sunroof drains can clog.
4. **Mazdaspeed Specific:** The turbocharger can wear out over high mileage. The exhaust manifold is known to crack. Proper maintenance, including synthetic oil changes, is critical for longevity.
