Character Breakdown and Casting Considerations

Belle

Belle is the heart of the show. She is intelligent, independent, and compassionate. The Enchanted Objects

Lumiere should be suave and energetic, Cogsworth fussy and precise, Mrs. Potts warm and maternal, and Chip bright and innocent. The ensemble of enchanted objects also includes Babette, the Wardrobe, and various other servants. These roles offer excellent opportunities for younger or less experienced performers to shine with memorable moments.

The Ensemble

The townspeople, villagers, and additional castle servants make up the ensemble. In the MTI Beauty and the Beast Jr Script, the ensemble is heavily featured in almost every musical number. This is a show where every cast member stays busy, and the ensemble work is crucial for creating the vibrant world of the story. Directors should plan for a large group, as the script provides ample opportunities for group choreography and vocal harmonies.

Costume Considerations

Lumiere can be achieved with a golden vest, candle-tipped gloves, and a warm light-up effect. Cogsworth uses a clock face worn as a medallion or carried as a prop. Mrs. Potts requires a teapot-shaped overskirt or apron. The key is to make costumes recognizable without being cumbersome, as young performers need to move and dance freely.

Lighting and Special Effects

The transformation scene and the rose's glow are the two most critical lighting moments.
