3. Continue adding larger curved shapes outward, each one slightly bigger and more open. Leave small gaps to suggest petals curling back.
4. Once the flower is about as wide as you want, draw two or three larger petals at the bottom that flare outward.
5. Add a curved stem below the flower and a few simple leaves — a teardrop shape with a center vein works perfectly.
6. Erase any overlapping guidelines and darken your final lines. For a pretty touch, shade gently on one side of each petal to give volume.

Dainty Daisy

Daisies are cheerful and straightforward:

1. Start with a small circle for the center of the flower.
2. Lightly draw a larger circle around it as a guide for petal length.
3. Draw individual petals as elongated ovals that touch the center circle. Space them evenly around — about 8 to 12 petals looks natural.
4. Make each petal slightly different in angle for a realistic look.
5. Add a thin stem and a couple of narrow leaves with pointed tips.
6. Optional: shade the center circle or add tiny dots inside it for texture. A pale yellow or white coloring makes this one of the most accessible **pretty things to draw step by step**.

Adorable Animal Drawings

Animals offer endless opportunities for cuteness. By simplifying features and using round shapes, you can create lovable characters that are surprisingly easy to draw.

Cute Cat Face

1. Draw a large circle for the head. Add a slightly smaller circle inside, overlapping the bottom – this will be the muzzle area.
2. Position two triangles on top of the head for ears. Make them slightly curved outward for a friendly look.
3. Inside the head, draw two large almond shapes for eyes. Add a smaller circle inside each for the pupil, and leave a tiny white dot for a highlight.
4. Below the eyes, draw a tiny inverted triangle for the nose. From the nose, drop a short vertical line and then curve it into a “W” shape for the mouth.
5. Add whiskers – three straight lines on each side of the muzzle. Keep them light and gentle.
6. Erase any extra guidelines and define the ears with inner shapes. Add a few strokes for fur texture around the cheeks.

Sweet Little Bird

A perched bird is a lovely subject for a simple drawing:

1. Sketch an oval for the body, tilted slightly upward.
2. Add a small circle on top for the head, overlapping the body.
3. Draw a tiny triangle for the beak on the front of the head.
4. For the wing, draw a curved teardrop shape along the side of the body. Add a few lines inside to suggest feathers.
5. Under the body, draw two thin lines for legs, ending in three small toes each. Add a thin branch beneath the feet.
6. Finish with a round eye and a little crest on top of the head. Shade the belly lightly to give it dimension.

Magical Landscapes and Scenery

Sometimes the prettiest drawings are not objects but entire scenes. Simple landscapes can be surprisingly atmospheric and rewarding.

Starry Night Sky

1. Draw a horizontal line about one-third from the bottom of the page. This is the horizon.
2. Above the horizon, add a few swirls or wavy lines to suggest clouds or wind. This is inspired by Van Gogh but much simpler.
3. Scatter dots of various sizes across the sky for stars. Cluster a few together to form small constellations.
4. Draw a crescent moon in one corner – just two overlapping circles, then erase the inner one.
5. Below the horizon, create a simple landscape. It could be rolling hills (gentle curved lines) or a calm lake (horizontal lines).
6. Optional: Use a black pen on white paper for a striking contrast, or use dark blue paper with white gel pen.

Peaceful Ocean Wave

1. Start with a long, gentle curve for the base of the wave, like a hill.
2. Draw a series of smaller, overlapping curves that rise above the main line. They should look like rolling water.
3. At the crest of the wave, add a few curved lines that curl downward, indicating foam and spray.
4. Inside the wave, draw thin, flowing lines that follow the shape – these represent water currents.
5. Add a few small circles or dashes at the top for foam bubbles.
6. In the background, draw a simple sun or a few clouds. This composition is both calming and visually pleasing.

Enchanting Fairy

1. Draw a small oval for the head. Below it, a slightly larger oval for the torso.

3. Sketch two thin curved lines for arms, ending in small circles for hands. Position them as if she is reaching out or holding something.
4. On the back, draw two elongated teardrop shapes for wings. Add a second pair behind them, slightly smaller.
5. Facial details: simple dots for eyes, a tiny curved line for a smile. Add wispy hair with flowing, curved lines.
6. Decorate the skirt with small stars or dots. A light pencil shading or wash of color makes this **pretty thing to draw step by step** truly magical.

1. Draw a large oval for the body and a smaller circle for the head, connected by a curved neck.
