

How To Renew My Australian Passport

- Your personal details (name, date of birth, gender) have not changed since that passport was issued. If you have changed your name, you will need to supply additional documentation and cannot use the simplified renewal.
- Your current or most recent passport is not damaged, lost, or stolen.
- You are not in possession of any other Australian passport.
- You are able to provide two identical recent passport photographs that meet strict Australian standards.

If any of these conditions are not satisfied—for example, your passport was issued when you were under 18, or you have changed your name through marriage—you will need to apply as a new applicant using form B8 or B82, not the renewal form. Understanding these criteria first will save you time and frustration.

What If My Passport Expired More Than Ten Years Ago?

If your most recent Australian passport expired over a decade ago, you are unfortunately ineligible for the renewal process. You will need to submit a full adult application under the new passport procedure. The same applies if you have never held an Australian passport. In that case, you will need to provide full evidence of citizenship and identity, which is a more involved process. However, for the vast majority of people asking "how to renew my Australian passport," the simpler renewal pathway applies.

Step-by-Step Process: How to Renew My Australian Passport

The renewal process can be completed either online through the Australian Passport Office's digital platform or via a paper application form obtained from an Australia Post outlet. Both methods require the same supporting documents and fees, but the online route is generally faster and more convenient. Below we break down each method.

Method 1: Online Renewal via the Australian Passport Office Website

The online renewal system is designed for Australian citizens living in Australia or overseas, provided you meet the eligibility criteria. To begin, visit the official APO website and create an account using your myGovID (a digital identity verification app). If you do not have a myGovID, you can create one for free.

1. **Log in to the Passport Office Portal:** Use your myGovID to authenticate and start a new renewal application.
2. **Complete the Digital Application Form:** You will be asked to confirm your personal details, answer security questions, and upload your digital passport photo. The system will guide you through each section.
3. **Upload Your Photograph:** You must provide a recent, high-quality photo that meets Australian standards. Online tools allow you to check compliance before submission.
4. **Pay the Renewal Fee:** Payment is made securely online via credit or debit card. As of 2025, the standard adult passport renewal fee is approximately AUD \$325 for a 10-year passport, plus any additional postage if you are overseas. Fees are subject to change, so always verify the current amount.
5. **Submit and Receive Confirmation:** After submission, you will receive a receipt and a reference number. You may also be required to print, sign, and post a declaration form if your application is flagged for additional verification.
6. **Processing and Delivery:** Standard processing for online renewals is about 6 weeks, though this can vary. You can track the status of your application online.

Method 2: Paper Application at Australia Post

If you prefer a face-to-face process or do not have access to a myGovID, you can visit a participating Australia Post outlet to obtain a renewal form. Many people still choose this option, especially if they need assistance with the photograph or documentation. Here is how:

1. **Obtain Form PC7:** Ask at the counter for the Australian Adult Passport Renewal form. Most Australia Post locations carry these or can print them for you.
2. **Complete the Form in Black Ink:** Fill in the details carefully. Mistakes can cause delays. Ensure your signature matches the one on your current passport.
3. **Provide Two Identical Photos:** One photo must be endorsed by an approved guarantor (an Australian citizen you have known for at least one year, such as a doctor, teacher, or bank manager). The other photo is attached to the form.
4. **Provide Your Current Passport:** You need to submit your existing passport with the application. It will be cancelled and returned to you with your new passport.
5. **Pay the Fee:** Fees are paid at the counter. Australia Post also charges a delivery fee for sending your new passport to you.
6. **Submit the Application:** The staff will check your documents and send the application to the Passport Office. They will give you a receipt with a reference number for tracking.

Required Documents for Renewal

Whether you apply online or by paper, you will need to provide the following:

- **Your current or most recent Australian passport.** It will be cancelled upon processing.
- **Two identical passport photos** taken within the last six months. They must meet strict specifications: plain white or off-white background, neutral expression, no glasses (unless medically required), and no shadows.
- **Proof of name change** (if applicable). For example, a marriage certificate or change of name deed. Note that a name change generally shifts you to a full application, not the simple renewal.
- **Guarantor endorsement** for paper applications. The guarantor must sign one of your photos and confirm your identity. Online applications may use the myGovID digital verification instead.
- **Payment** of the applicable fee.

Important Notes on Photographs

The Australian Passport Office is very strict about photograph compliance. Common reasons for rejection include smiling (a neutral expression is required), hair covering the eyebrows, shadows on the face, or wearing a hat or headwear for non-religious reasons. It is often worthwhile to have your photos taken at a professional photography service that is familiar with passport requirements, especially if you are applying by paper.

Processing Times and Delays

Standard processing for Australian passport renewals is currently around six weeks, but this can fluctuate depending on seasonal demand and the complexity of your application. The APO often publishes estimated processing times on its website, which are updated regularly. During peak travel seasons (e.g., Australian summer holidays), processing can take longer. For urgent renewals, the Passport Office offers an express service for an additional fee (approximately AUD \$237 on top of the regular fee), which can reduce processing to about two weeks, provided you have an immediate travel itinerary.

Factors that can cause delays include:

- Incorrect or blurry photographs.
- Incomplete forms or missing signatures.
- Name mismatch between the application and your documentation.
- Need for further identity checks, especially if your appearance has changed significantly.

To avoid delays, double-check every detail before submitting. If you are applying from overseas, allow additional time for international postage both ways.

Renewing from Overseas

If you are an Australian citizen living abroad and need to renew your passport, the process is largely the same, but with a few important differences. You can apply online using myGovID regardless of your location. However, you may be asked to attend an Australian embassy, high commission, or consulate to verify your identity or to provide fingerprints if you cannot use the digital verification. The fee for overseas renewals is higher to cover courier costs. Additionally, your new passport will be sent to your overseas address via secure courier. If you plan to travel soon, consider applying well in advance as processing times can be longer for international applicants due to shipping and verification requirements.

Common Mistakes to Avoid When Renewing Your Passport

A seamless renewal experience is achievable if you are aware of the most frequent errors. Here are some pitfalls to watch for:

- **Leaving it to the last minute:** Even if you have an urgent appointment, express processing is not guaranteed. Apply at least two months before your intended travel date.
- **Using a photo from more than six months ago:** The regulations require a recent photograph, even if you haven't changed appearance.
- **Signing incorrectly:** Your signature on the application must match the one on your current passport. If you have changed your signature style, you may need to provide additional verification.
- **Forgetting to include a guarantor for paper applications:** The guarantor must be an Australian citizen who has known you for at least one year and meet specific professional criteria.
- **Assuming digital photos are automatically compliant:** Even if you use an online tool, it is wise to have a professional check your photo before submission.

Frequently Asked Questions

Can I renew my passport if it is still valid?

Yes, you can renew at any time, even if your current passport has several years left. The remaining validity will not be added to your new passport; the new passport will be valid for 10 years from the date of issue.

How much does it cost to renew an Australian passport?

As of 2025, the standard adult renewal fee is approximately AUD \$325. Express processing adds about AUD \$237. Overseas applications incur an additional surcharge. Always check the APO website for the latest fee schedule.

Do I need to send my old passport when renewing online?
