Sports Programming

Dallas is a city that bleeds sports. From high school football to the Dallas Stars hockey, sports programming is a primary driver for cable subscriptions. The legacy TWC systems in Dallas historically placed sports networks in a dedicated block.

- **Bally Sports Southwest:** (Formerly Fox Sports Southwest) is the home for the Texas Rangers, Dallas Mavericks, and Dallas Stars. This channel is usually found in the 600s range for HD or a lower analog channel.
- **ESPN Networks:** ESPN, ESPN2, and ESPNNews are typically found in the lower 30s or 200s depending on your setup.
- **NFL Network and Red Zone:** Essential for Sunday football fans, usually located in the 300s range.
- **The Longhorn Network:** A staple for University of Texas fans, often placed near the regional sports tier.

News and Information
