Accessory Work for Balance and Aesthetics

Practice

- **Friday:** Full body power day. Main lifts: Clean and jerk or power cleans (3x3). Accessories: Weighted pull-ups, push presses, farmers walks. Light conditioning (sled drags).
- **Saturday:** Active recovery. Light calisthenics, mobility work, foam rolling, and a long walk or gentle yoga.
- **Sunday:** Complete rest. Focus on sleep, meal prep, and mental recovery.

Each workout begins with a thorough warm-up that includes dynamic stretching, foam rolling, and light sets of the main lift. Cool-down includes static stretching and sometimes a few minutes of low-intensity cardio.

Lessons from Triple H’s Training Philosophy
