And "Roller Coaster" is a playful metaphor for the ups and downs of a relationship, complete with a music video that spoofs reality TV. Critical and Commercial Reception

Upon its release, **Take Off Your Pants And Jacket** debuted at number one on the Billboard 200, selling over 350,000 copies in its first week. Critics praised the album for its hook-laden
