"Water You turned into wine, opened the eyes of the blind." Finally, the return

to A major provides a moment of brightness before the phrase resolves. When practicing the verse, pay close attention to the timing. The chords are not played at a uniform pace; there is a subtle rubato that allows the lyrics to breathe. A common beginner mistake is to rush the C# minor chord, which should be held just long enough to let the emotional weight of the line sink in. The right hand can play simple root position triads, or you can experiment with inversions to create a smoother voice leading. For example, playing B/D# instead of a root position B chord creates a seamless transition from the preceding E chord.

The Chorus Climax

As the song moves into the chorus, the energy rises both dynamically and harmonically. The chorus chord progression is A - E - B - C#m - A - E - B, a sequence that feels both triumphant and resolute. The switch to A major at the beginning of the chorus immediately signals a shift in emotional register; it is brighter, more open, and more declarative. The return to E after A creates a classic IV - I resolution that feels satisfying and complete. For pianists, the chorus offers an opportunity to open up the voicing. Instead of playing close-position chords, try spreading the notes across a wider range. For instance, play the A major

chord as A - C# - E in the left hand while adding a melodic line in the right hand. This creates a fuller, more orchestral sound that supports the congregational singing. The B chord acts as a dominant, pushing back toward the tonic E, and should be played with a sense of forward motion. If you are accompanying a singer or a congregation, consider adding a slight crescendo through the chorus to build toward the final declaration "Our God is greater, our God is stronger."

Techniques for an

While knowing the correct chord shapes is essential, the true artistry of playing "Our God" lies in how you voice and connect those chords. Chris Tomlin's original recording features a full band, but the piano arrangement can stand alone if played with intention. One of the most effective techniques for this song is the use of arpeggiated chords in the verses. Instead of striking all three notes of a triad simultaneously, roll them from bottom to top. This creates a gentle, flowing texture that mimics the intimacy of the opening lyrics. For the chorus, you can switch to solid, block chords played with a firm but not harsh

touch. The contrast between the arpeggiated verses and the solid chorus creates a dynamic arc that mirrors the song's lyrical journey from reflection to declaration. Additionally, consider adding a suspended chord at key moments. For example, replacing the B major chord with a Bsus4 chord just before the final line of the chorus adds a moment of tension that makes the resolution even more satisfying.

Pedaling and Dynamics

The sustain pedal is your best friend when playing worship music, but it must be used judiciously. For "Our God," a good rule of thumb is to change the pedal with each chord change in the

verses to avoid muddying the harmony. In the chorus, you can hold the pedal slightly longer, especially on the A and E chords, to create a wash of sound that supports the powerful lyrics. Dynamics are equally important. The verses should be played at a piano or mezzo-piano level, with a soft, introspective touch. The chorus calls for a forte or even fortissimo dynamic, particularly on the lines "And if our God is for us, then who could ever stop us?" Pay attention to the crescendo that builds through the bridge (the section that repeats "And if our God is for us"). This is the emotional peak of the song, and the piano should reflect that with increased volume, broader chord voicings, and a more aggressive use of the sustain pedal.

Inversions and Voice Leading

Voice leading is the secret ingredient that separates a functional piano player from a truly musical one. In the context of "Our God," smooth voice leading means that the notes you play in each chord move as little as possible to the next chord. For example, when moving from E major (E - G# - B) to B major (B - D# - F#), you can keep the B note in place and move the other fingers minimally. This creates a connected, fluid sound that is pleasing to the ear. Similarly, when moving from B to C# minor, try playing C# minor in its first inversion (E - G# - C#) to keep the E and G# notes from the previous chord. These small adjustments make the

progression sound less blocky and more like a seamless musical statement. Practicing the song with inversions will also help you memorize the progression more deeply, as you will be thinking in terms of intervals and relationships rather than isolated chord shapes.

Common Challenges and How to Overcome Them

Many beginner and intermediate pianists encounter specific hurdles when learning "Our God." One of the most common is the transition between the B major chord and the C# minor chord. The finger stretch from B (root position: B - D# - F#) to C# minor (C# - E - G#)

can feel awkward, especially for players with smaller hands. A practical solution is to play the B chord in its second inversion (F# - B - D#) so that your hand is already positioned near the C# minor shape. Another challenge is maintaining a steady tempo during the bridge, which features a repeated chord pattern that can easily become rushed. The bridge uses the same four chords as the verses but with a different rhythmic feel. Practice the bridge with a metronome, starting at a slower tempo and gradually increasing to performance speed. Finally, many players struggle with singing and playing simultaneously. If you are leading worship, start by humming the melody while playing the chords. Once the coordination feels natural, add the lyrics. Break the song into small sections and master each one before attempting the entire piece.

Adapting the Chords for Different Keys

While E major is the original key, it may not suit every singer's vocal range. Transposing the Our God Chris Tomlin piano chords to a different key is a valuable skill for any worship pianist. The most common alternative keys are D major and F major. In D major, the chord progression becomes D - A - Bm - G for the verses and G - D - A - Bm - G - D - A for the chorus. In F major, the progression shifts to F - C - Dm - Bb for

the verses and Bb - F - C - Dm - Bb - F - C for the chorus. When transposing, remember that the relationships between the chords remain the same; only the starting pitch changes. The I - V - vi - IV progression (E - B - C#m - A in the original) translates to any key. Learning to think in terms of scale degrees rather than specific note names will make transposition second nature. If you play with a capo on the guitar, you may need to adjust the piano part to match the guitar's pitch. Communication with the rest of the worship team is essential to ensure everyone is playing in the same key.

Personal Style

Once you have mastered the basic chord progression, you can begin to add embellishments that make the song your own. One simple but effective technique is to add a grace note or a quick passing tone before a chord change. For example, before striking the A major chord in the chorus, play a quick G# as a lead-in. This creates a sense of anticipation and adds a professional polish. Another option is to incorporate a walking bass line in the left hand. Instead of playing root-position chords, play single bass notes that move stepwise between the roots

of the chords. For the sequence E - B - C#m - A, the left hand could play E - F# - G# - A, connecting the chords with a melodic line. This technique works particularly well in the verses, where the arrangement is more sparse. For the chorus, you can add rhythmic comping patterns in the right hand, such as playing eighth-note chord stabs on beats 2 and 4. This creates a driving, energetic feel that supports the congregational singing. Remember that embellishments should serve the song, not distract from it. Always prioritize clarity and emotional impact over technical display.
