- The Latin Motto:** The banner in the eagle's beak reads "**E PLURIBUS UNUM**" ("Out of Many, One"). This is a foundational motto of the United States, referring to the union of the 13 colonies into a single nation, but also to the ideal of a diverse people merging into one cohesive society.
